The Nevada Community School District and the Colo-Nesco Community School District have been good neighbors for many years, partnering in areas such as vehicle maintenance and repair. This year, the districts expanded their cooperative spirit to include technology (a purchased service from NCSD to C-N) and a Transportation Director (via Operational Sharing).

Operational Function Sharing is offered to districts by the Iowa Department of Education via Iowa Code 257.11 which allows Iowa school districts to receive supplemental weighting (funding) for the sharing of eight eligible positions: Superintendent Management (8 FTE), Business Management (5 FTE), Human Resources Management (5 FTE), Transportation Management (5 FTE), Operations & Maintenance Management (5 FTE), Curriculum Director (3 FTE), and School Counselor (3 FTE). Each position is weighted according to the FTE (full time equivalency) of state funding equal to that of one student. Once districts enter into a sharing agreement for one of the eligible positions, they open their 5-year window of eligibility for funding for all operational sharing. Districts may receive this supplemental state funding for a maximum of 21 FTE for any one year during their 5-years of eligibility.

Next year (2016-2017) the two districts have agreed to expand their partnership to include the operational sharing of Superintendent and Curriculum Director (Director of School Improvement & Innovation), which will bring operational sharing between the two districts to 16 FTE. This will bring each of the districts an addition of approximately \$105,000-\$110,000 in state aid annually for the remaining 4 years of operational sharing. During a time in which the Iowa Legislature has set allowable growth to Iowa school districts at 2% or less for 5 of the past 6 years, any additional funding opportunities are critical to sustain and grow programming for our students.

The Nevada and Colo-Nesco districts continue to explore every option to maintain and grow resources for student opportunities. School districts of all sizes have much to offer the varying needs of diverse student populations. By working together, both districts hope to enhance the ability to meet those varying needs.

Open Enrollment Reminder



Parents/guardians considering the use of the Open Enrollment option to enroll their child/ren in another public school

district in the State of Iowa should be aware of the following dates:

September 1, 2016 – Last date for Open Enrollment requests for students entering kindergarten in the Fall of 2016.

* March 1, 2016 – Last date for regular Open Enrollment requests for the 2016-17 school year.

Parents/guardians of Open Enrolled students whose income falls below 160% of the federal poverty guidelines are eligible for transportation assistance. This may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend.

Parents should be aware that the Open Enrollment may result in the loss of athletic eligibility. For further details, contact the Superintendent's Office at 382-2783.

Parents of current **6th graders**: Your child will be required to get new immunizations before entering 7th grade. In 2013 the lowa Department of Public Health began requiring all students entering 7th grade or having a birthdate after September 15, 2000 to get an updated Tdap (Tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis). The Boys & Girls Club of Story County's Afterschool Program is back in full swing this year. The program is based in the Nevada Middle School (room 18) and takes place Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30 to 6pm. Each day those in attendance participate in various programs and activities. The day begins with a snack and homework time and then moves into club programming. On Tuesdays, the after school program offers a science club and SMART Moves, a skills mastery and resistance training program. After homework time on Thursdays, the program really starts to focus on building productive, caring, and responsible citizens through a program called Torch Club, a volunteer and leadership program, and Drama Matters, a performing arts program. There is never a dull moment for our participants!


Pantry Pies

Guest speaker informs Nevada students about Belize

Kelli Soll, Nevada High School graduate 2007, was the guest speaker in Mr. Cooper's Natural Resources class on December 22nd. Kelli has started a service based company called Global Service Partnerships that can provide young people with a volunteer experience in Belize. Belize is geographically the size of Massachusetts and borders Mexico and Guatemala. In spite of being a popular coastal vacation area, a mainstream of population remains under educated in several skills, especially English. GSP can provide high school students in grades 9-12 an opportunity to assist Belize children. Several of Mr. Cooper's students expressed interest in such an opportunity.



Nevada Students study Renewable Energy

Students in Mr. Cooper's Natural Resources class have been studying the varying forms of renewable energy including photovoltaic, wind turbines, geothermal, advance biofuels, and tidal energy.

Students constructed basic generators using magnets and coils of copper wire and measured output using multi-meters and small DC bulbs. Students also designed and built small wind turbines with a pulley to lift a cup with a varying amount of metal washers for load.

Finally, a field trip to the John & Nancy Clough farm southwest of Nevada allowed to discover "working" PV panels and small wind. "The photovoltaic panels are doing quite well and providing a good return" says John Clough.





8th Grade Careers Exploratory Class-Opportunities Available

In the 8th grade Careers Exploratory class, a big component of the course is the Job Shadow experience. What better way to "explore" a career than to spend a few hours to a full day immersed in some aspect of that field? With today's technology, the pathways to finding information about different careers is no doubt countless, but I believe no website or video could ever offer the same authentic experience and exposure as an actual day at the job.

Many students have taken full advantage of this opportunity to seek out a person whose work truly embodies their interests, finding the experience invaluable. Veterinarians, business owners, law officers, pilots, teachers, newscasters, bakers, and sports trainers are just a few of the professionals our students have been able to work with and shadow. Students were able to experience the day-to-day routines, being exposed to the small nuances of that particular job, which can't be fully conveyed in a written job description or website. Many were able to be first-hand witnesses to what success looks like and revel in the benefits of such success. Others saw failure or trials but observed problem-solving skills put to practice. They learned what aspects of a career really excited them and which ones seemed incompatible with their personality.

Without willing professionals, who offer their valuable time, job shadows would not be possible. 2016 FFA Winter Dinner-Giving Back to the Community

In spite of below zero weather, thirty one Nevada High School FFA members volunteered on Sunday, January 17th to prepare, serve and deliver over 308 meals to community members. The students had assistance from adult volunteers including Kate Huse, Jim & Joan Wahl, and Chris & Charlie Lloyd. High School custodians Mike Prather & Soukaing Phommasen helped out also.

Nevada community residents in attendance enjoyed a flavorful dinner consisting of slow roasted turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy, corn bread stuffing, green beans with bacon & butter, whole baked sweet potatoes (donated by Andy Swanson), chilled lemonade, and coffee. For dessert, students prepared cakes, brownies, cookies, dessert breads, cupcakes, pie, and assorted pastry items. There was no admission fee and no money was solicited for the dinner from attendees.

While 277 meals were served in the high school commons, three groups of students delivered over thirty one meals to elderly citizens, and those unable to travel. Mid-West Pack catered the main course of turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes & gravy. The students and adult volunteers prepared the green beans, sweet potatoes, beverages and desserts.

Several direct monetary donations were provided including \$100 from Mike & Patsy Ackerman, \$50 from Dennis & Sondra Smith, and miscellaneous cash donations from delivery recipients. All donations are greatly appreciated.



Nevada FFA Fruit Record Sales

Nevada High School FFA members sold, mixed, and delivered a new all-time record \$31,580,00 in fruit, cheese, sausage and snacks sold to community customers. In 2014, Nevada FFA set a new record at \$26,661. "I am very proud of the students, parents and the customers that support this fundraiser" stated Kevin Cooper, Nevada FFA advisor. The chapter also purchased bulk fruit and repackaged into specialized mixed boxes for variety preferences. Customers could choose from twentynine different fruit packages, twenty-one cheese & meats, and eighteen different candy items. The chapter unloaded the product with the JD 480 heavyduty all-terrain forklift that Van Wall Equipment donated to the chapter in the fall of 2013. Top sellers included: In first place was Filicity Robinson at \$2,057 in sales, Chance Steffes in second place with \$1,897, and third was Alexis Black at \$1,151 in sales. All students were provided with a lesson in basic product introduction and how to close a sale. Mr. Cooper emphasized the importance of sales skills in many occupations. The wholesale product invoices totaled \$19,241.01, therefore providing the FFA chapter with a net profit of \$12,339. Money from this fundraiser will be used to help pay for the annual FFA banquet, career development contest, leadership conferences, FFA jackets, and senior scholarships. These funds will also help pay for other Nevada FFA chapter sponsored activities.



Recent Donations to Nevada FFA

Gene & Brian Colhoun donated a Case 1170 diesel tractor to the Nevada FFA on November 24th. Tyler McDonald of Van Wall Equipment brought the semi and lowboy to Colhoun's and loaded the tractor with assistance from Brian Colhoun, Hunter Anderson, and Mr. Cooper.

Other donations recently include a Sears Lawn & Garden tractor with snow blower and tire chains from Mike Nusbaum. The chapter sold the snow blower to a customer from Gilbert for \$300. The tractor will be worked on in Ag mechanics class.

Lorna Sellberg donated a stack of Sears Craftsman toolboxes full of tools, along with a Stihl 039 chainsaw that runs really well. Sellberg also donated a garden tiller for use in the chapter garden program. The chapter made repairs for Sellberg on a Husquarvana 16" chain saw. Cody Randall, Nevada High School senior also donated a Stihl MS 210 chainsaw that is in good shape also.

Dr. Paul Readhead donated two 11 x 16 SL steering tires mounted on Massey rims on November 23rd. Colfax Tractor Parts purchased the tires and rims for \$150 and also donated two new heavy-duty 12-volt batteries for the Case 1170 tractor project on November 28th.

A grain wagon and running gear donated to Nevada FFA were sold on December 8th to Gene Anderson of Princeton, Missouri for \$300. He plans to make mobile deer stands out of the wagons. All donations are greatly appreciated.



KEY Cooperative Provides Grain

Greg Artz & Ted Hammes of KEY Cooperative visited Mr.Cooper's block 4 class on November 10th to present the "Bushels for Ag" program. Nevada FFA will receive 40 bushels of soybeans and 100 bushels of corn donated to participate in the program. Students must determine a marketing strategy and make decisions based on fundamental market information to sell at the optimum times. Artz explained basics of commodity price discovery, basis, futures, and price averaging over time. Also, an algorithm was shared that calculated input cost and necessary commodity priced and sold to achieve break even. Some calculations were worked through with students regarding crop insurance income & yield risk management. Artz also explained his family's business of producing heirloom vegetables for niche markets. Some of his vegetables include lighter colored pumpkins and specially flavored Russian tomatoes varieties.



Nevada FFA Provides Program for Nevada Chamber of Commerce Annual Event

Nevada FFA provided the program for the Nevada Chamber of Commerce Annual Banquet and Awards Dinner held Thursday, October 22nd at Gatherings in downtown Nevada. After some brief business and an excellent meal catered by Farmhouse Catering, it was time for the program. Kevin Cooper, Nevada High School Ag Ed Instructor & FFA advisor gave a brief description of some history of the Nevada High School program and then introduced Erik Fevold & Courtney Davis, co-chairs of the 4th Annual Iowa High School Renewable Energy Conference. Other chapter members gave descriptions of their experiences including the FFA career development events, Ag mechanics projects, farm to school produce program, and finally the World Food Prize Global Youth Institute. Mr. Cooper and the students fielded several questions including volatility of hydrogen fuel, how to get young people more interested in career technical fields, and how many FFA activities provide speaking opportunities. Cooper pointed out that all of the students in attendance have been in numerous career development events where they learn to "speak with conviction"! Cooper cited an appreciation for the strong work ethic that his students have, which goes back to expectations fostered by parents and family.



Fall 212 and 360 Leadership Conferences

In the fall sixteen Nevada High School students and FFA members departed Nevada High School on a Saturday at 7:30 am and headed for the Iowa FFA Enrichment Center in Ankeny on the DMACC campus. In the winter another eleven attended.

Twelve students attended the 212 Degree leadership conferences in the fall and eight in the winter. The 212° Conference is a leadership conference created by the National FFA Organization and is open to FFA members in **9**th **or 10**th **grade**. 212 degrees is temperature at which water boils. At 211° water is extremely hot, but just one more degree takes up another level and changes its state. The 212°

Conference challenges students to push past their limits to the boiling point of leadership.

Four students in the fall and three in the winter attended the 360 Degree program. The 360° Conference is a leadership conference created by the National FFA Organization and is open to FFA members in 11th or 12th grade. 360° takes students full circle through chapter leadership development. Attendees will learn how to develop action plans for their chapters from every angle. Themes for this conference are vision and influence.

While the FFA members were in conference, Mr. Cooper participated in a continuing education class learning about the new National FFA on-line proficiency award applications. FFA members can compete with their Supervised Ag Experience Program in one of the thirty-four proficiency areas. All Ag students and FFA members are required to maintain records on a Supervised Ag Experience program. In addition, Cooper and several other Ag teachers and FFA advisors went through improving SAE records utilizing the AET, or Iowa FFA Google \$ & Hours record keeping system.

Recently elected National FFA Central Region Vice-President Abrah Meyers was at the Enrichment Center to meet members, supporters and advisors. Abrah's parents accompanied her also.

The conference fee was \$40 per student, Nevada FFA chapter paid for \$30 of the fee, and the students paid \$10. The day long of activities concluded around 6 pm, Mr. Cooper drove the bus, and the group arrived back to the high school around 6:45 pm.

The Nevada Community School District will increase the number of students proficient in reading, math and science until it meets the target recommended by No Child Left Behind (NCLB) of 100% proficiency as determined by Iowa Assessments.

The following graphs show the percentage of students in each score range.

The lowa Assessments differ from lowa Test of Basic Skills and lowa Test of Educational Development in scoring proficiency. The lowa Assessments use standard scores rather than percentile rank. Because of that change, each grade level and each subject area has a different proficiency band. The graphs below will indicate proficiency in each grade level and each subject area. 

- Intermediate + Advanced = Proficient


Academic Goals for 2014-2015

- To increase the percentage IEP students proficient in 4th grade reading as determined by the Iowa Assessments.
 - $\circ~$ IEP proficiency decreased from 71.4% in 2014 as 3^{rd} graders to 47.7% in 2015 as 4^{th} graders. Goal Not Met
- To increase the percentage of SES students proficient in 8th grade math as determined by the Iowa Assessment.
 - SES proficiency increased in math from 61.9%% in 2014 as 7th graders to 71.9% in 2015 as 8th graders. Goal Met
- To increase the percentage of SES students proficient in 11th grade science as determined by Iowa Assessments.
 - SES proficiency increased in science 68.3% in 2014 as 10th graders to 76% in 2015 as 11th graders. Goal Met



Academic Goals for 2015-2016:

- •To increase the percent of students proficient in 4th grade reading as determined by lowa Assessments, specifically increase from 87.23% proficient.
- •To increase the percent of SES students proficient in 8th grade mathematics as determined by Iowa Assessments, specifically increasing from 69.67% proficient.
- •To increase the percent of SES students proficient in 11th grade science as determined by Iowa Assessments, specifically increasing from 76.90% proficient.

EARLY CHILDHOOD LITERACY

The Nevada Community School District believes in early intervention to insure all students have the prerequisite skills in reading. For the first time the FAST assessment was given to K-4 students to assist in finding strengths and weaknesses in students' reading skill. FAST (Formative Assessment System for Teachers) is a suite of tools designed to monitor progress and analyze reading skills of students from kindergarten to fifth grade.

The first assessment tool is an oral reading assessment that allows teachers to monitor their students' progress and evaluate the level and rate of a student's oral reading fluency. (NOTE: This is an indicator of RATE, not true fluency. If students read fast they pass. If they pause, read with inflection or self-correct, it could negatively impact their overall score.)

The second assessment tool is Early Reading (eReading). It is an evidenced based reading assessment for screening and monitoring student progress in early primary grades K-3.

Lastly the Adaptive Reading (aReading) tool is a computer test of broad reading skills that is individualized. The question and response format of this assessment is multiple choice and fill in the blank.

To meet state requirements of early childhood literacy the district is required to report findings from Kindergarten through 3rd grade. Because this assessment takes the place of the DIBELS assessment, there will be no historical data this year. The following table shows the results of the first year of the FAST assessment.

Grade	Substantially Deficient	Adequately Progressing
K	7%	93%
1 st	17%	83%
2 nd	13%	87%
3 rd	9%	91%

If a 2nd or 3rd grade student is substantially deficient at the end of the 2015-16 school year, we will request that he/she attend our summer school. Summer school will consist of reading instruction tailored to the individual needs of the students. After the 2016-17 school year, based on the State of lowa's Early Literacy Implementation, a 3rd grade student that ends the year as substantially deficient is required to attend summer school or be retained.


