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The Opener

As fall nears and the summer temperatures cool, it's another great time to get outside and enjoy Story County! Opportunities to get outside are all around Nevada. Many of these areas are managed by Story County Conservation.



Located just south of Nevada on Country Club Road, the Hertz Family Woods & Nature Preserve is a diverse woodland that includes 22 tree species, many wildflowers, and a one-mile trail. Hiking, walking, bird watching, geocaching, and several other activities can be enjoyed there.

This property was donated by the Hertz family to the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation in memory of Carl, Marjory, and C. Douglas Hertz. The park was transferred to Story County Conservation in 2012. This was the first time a turn-key park was donated to Story County Conservation and perhaps to any public agency in Iowa. This gesture illustrates the commitment of the family to the community and to the land they call home.

Additionally, to the southeast of Nevada is Hickory Grove Park, where you can camp, fish, swim, hike, walk the trails and so much more. Directly south on S-14 is the Jennett Heritage Area, a 171-acre property boasting diverse plant and animal life featuring 25 acres of remnant prairie, two ponds, and two streams where you can hike, walk, bird watch, and geocache. Going north of Nevada, are the Carroll Prairie and Larson Marsh sites where you can see native prairie remnants and wetland habitat areas.

In total, Story County Conservation manages more than 3,500 acres of parks and natural areas, including lakes, campgrounds, and trails, and an additional 5,500 acres of roadside habitat through our Integrated Roadside Vegetation Management program. The environmental education staff serves Story County schools and the public with interpretive and informational programs for all ages. Story County Conservation's volunteer program provides volunteer opportunities to individuals and groups interested in making a difference in local natural resources.

Fiscal Year 2022 Annual Report

Story County's Annual Report is moving to a fiscal year schedule. Why?

In Iowa, counties are empowered to perform any function to "protect and preserve the rights, privileges, and property of the county or of its residents, and to preserve and improve the peace, safety, health, welfare, comfort, and convenience of its residents" except as limited by the constitution or a statute. (Iowa Code 331.301(1)). In order to accomplish this, counties budget for and provide nine* major areas of county services: 1) public safety and legal, 2) physical health and social, 3) county environment and education, 4) roads and transportation, 5) government services to residents, 6) administration, 7) non-program current, 8) debt service, and 9) capital projects.

A county's budget is a financial guide or plan for the next fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. Many businesses and agencies release annual reports after the first of the calendar year, presenting an overview of the highlights and successes for the year prior. Historically, Story County followed a similar schedule, but we are shifting our approach to presenting our annual report on a fiscal year basis (releasing in August/September).

This will allow us all to comprehensively review where financial decisions were most impactful and where improvements can be made to continue to meet the County's needs. With this change to our report calendar, we can evaluate trends more effectively when we start our budget discussions this coming

fall. The information will provide a complete picture of the past year and assist us in planning the Fiscal Year 2024 budget and our Capital Improvements Plan.

Reminder about Property Taxes... Property taxes are due on or before Sept. 30, 2022. Unpaid taxes will be assessed a penalty of 1.5% and accrue an additional 1.5% fee for each month the payment is late. The Treasurer's Office is encouraging payment online at www.iowatreasurers.org as the e-check option is only 25 cents. Taxpayers need to use the receipt number from their statement to submit the payment and must complete the payment by 11:59 p.m. on Sept. 30. The Treasurer's Office is open for walk-in customers, on a first-come, first-served basis. The office is open Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Property owners paying in the office can pay by check, cash, or credit/debit card (credit or debit cards incur an additional fee). There are also 24-hour drop boxes available at the Administration Building, 900 6th St., in Nevada. In-office or drop-box payments must be made by 4:30 p.m. on Sept. 30. Taxpayers may also mail the payment slip and payment to P.O. Box 498, Nevada, IA 50201. All payments must be postmarked on or before Sept. 30, 2022 to avoid any late penalties. Payers who would like a receipt need to include a self-addressed and stamped envelope.

Ben Hurd of Ames (pictured) was working part time at a fast food restaurant in Ames when he decided to sign up for the Story County Retraining Program.

"The program provided a target job fair to help with employment, an incentive stipend for obtaining and retraining for a job in the community for at least a month, and a host of quality individuals to help with references," he said.

Now working at Story County Medical Center in Nevada as a CNA, Hurd is glad he took the initiative to learn something new.

"The CNA certification is very useful and can be applied to many things throughout life. From obtaining a good job in a field that will always be around, to understanding how to help others in an emergency, all the way to caring for loved ones who may be advancing in years," he noted.

Hurd had been a student at DMACC before, so he knew a little bit of what to expect. But, he said, the retraining program was a very good experience. Teachers were always ready to teach and explain, classmates had interesting and varied backgrounds, and staff members were always willing to help or explain things he didn't understand.

In addition, the educational component was provided free of charge, along with gas cards, equipment and supplies, including a loaner laptop from DMACC.

Ben has settled in nicely at Story Medical Center in Nevada. "I've found a reliable employer where I fit nicely and can work effectively... My life has stabilized greatly."

His advice to others: "Don't be afraid to use the Story County Retraining Program. Certificates are relatively short programs compared to other academic achievements, so in the time it would take to receive a degree, you can take several certifications and become employed in the field of your choice."

Nevada Public Safety officials can help with proper disposal of firearms, ammo, or fireworks

The Nevada Public Safety Department can assist you with the disposal of any unwanted firearm, ammunition, or fireworks.

Unwanted items may include:

- Firearms found while cleaning out houses or storage units,
- Damaged or unusable firearms, or
- Fireworks a family decides, at any given time, they do not want to keep.
- Ammunition may be turned in if it is damaged, rusty, unneeded, or appears unsafe to maintain.

Please call the non-emergency number at 515-382-4305 to arrange for the disposal.

Things to think about when turning in items:

- 1) Arrange for a time to meet with an officer as we may not be in the police department when you arrive.
- 2) Please keep the firearm in a bag or box when you arrive at the police department. If you do not have the ability to safely carry the firearm into the department, you can request to have an officer respond to your

house to turn over the firearm.

- 3) Please do not bring fireworks into the police department, even if they unexpectedly did not explode. Call for an officer (515-382-4305) to discuss options with you.
- 4) All firearms turned in will be checked to make sure they are not reported stolen and then transferred to the State for safe destruction.
- 5) All fireworks and ammunition will be safely destroyed through partnerships in the State.

Lincoln Highway traveling exhibit

The Lincoln Highway Traveling Exhibition, an audiovisual display that tells the story of the national Lincoln Highway is now available for viewing at the Nevada Public Library, where it will remain through September.

"Many of us have driven the Lincoln Highway, but haven't realized its significance for the unfolding of our country's modern history. This exhibition tells that story," said Shellie Orngard, Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway coordinator.



The exhibit — *Promise Road: How the Lincoln Highway Changed America* — was funded in part by a grant from the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs and with support from the Iowa Department of Transportation. *Promise Road* recalls the building of the Lincoln Highway being initiated in 1913, and tells the dramatic story of ingenuity, personality, commerce, and adventure behind the highway. It will engage those viewing it in a new understanding of and appreciation of our forgotten past and what it means for us today.

Beyond Awareness: Breast Cancer & BRCA Panel Discussion

Breast cancer will affect nearly one in eight women in their lifetime, according to the National Breast Cancer Coalition. The Nevada Public Library is kicking off National Breast Cancer Month (October) by bringing together a panel of women to educate, inform, and share their own stories relating to this disease and the BRCA genetic mutation. Learn about the berries and the bees at event near Nevada



If you're looking for something fun to do on Saturday, Sept. 17, look no further than three to four miles south of Nevada.

From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. that day, Prairie Rivers of Iowa, along with Story County Conservation, ISU Extension, the Iowa Monarch Conservation Consortium, the Outdoor Alliance of Story County, and the Story County Soil and Water Conservation District, brings "Bees and Berries Field Day" to Berry Patch Farm and the Jennett Heritage Area.

"The idea came from our team wanting to have an event that is fun and family-friendly that educates the public about the importance of pollinators for our food supply," said Mike Kellner, public relations and marketing coordinator for Prairie Rivers of Iowa. "Thus, the Berry Patch location, and the importance of native habitat, like the prairie at the Jennett Heritage Area, are critical for health and survival of pollinators."

Kellner said this will be the second time the organizations have held this event, which will include a number of fun learning activities. Those are as follows:

At Jennett Heritage Area (roughly 4 miles south of Nevada, along 280th Street)

- Guided pollinator and prairie walks
- Tub of creek critters
- Scavenger hunt

At Berry Patch Farm (just east of the Jennett Heritage Area):

- Face painting (tentative)
- Scavenger hunt
- Picking fruit and berries (for a fee)
- Many table displays from different partners, including Iowa State's "build your own native bee nest" - how pollinators help orchards produce food

Prairie Rivers:

- Pollinator/prairie walks
- Creek Critters

Story County Conservation:

- Pollinator/prairie walks at Jennett

- Live specimens showing monarch life cycle

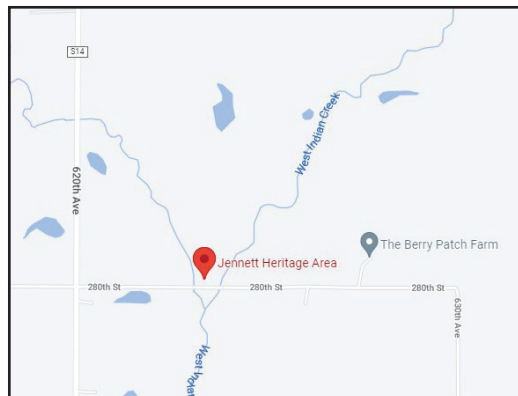

Back-to-school safety

As the 2022-2023 school year begins, it is the perfect time to review safety for both students as well as drivers on the roadway. According to the National Safety Council, every day in the United States more than 40 kids are hit by a vehicle while walking.

Please follow these tips if you are a driver on the roadway:

- Do not block crosswalks as this may cause pedestrians to have to go into the path of moving traffic.
- If you are driving through a school zone when the flashers are blinking, do not forget to stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk.
- If the yellow or red light is flashing on a bus and the arm is extended,



traffic must stop.

- Watch for bikes coming from behind parked cars or driveways.

Please follow these tips if you are a pedestrian:

- If you are bicycling as a form of transportation, make sure you are wearing a correctly fitted helmet with the chin strap securely fastened.

- Make sure you travel in the same direction as traffic whether you are walking or biking, and follow the traffic signals and signs.
- Use the sidewalk whenever possible.
- Make sure you are watching the roadway and paying attention to your surroundings, and do not be distracted by something such as a cell phone.

Everyone has responsibilities on the roadway whether you are walking, riding your bike, or driving a vehicle. Following the provided tips will help keep everyone safe!

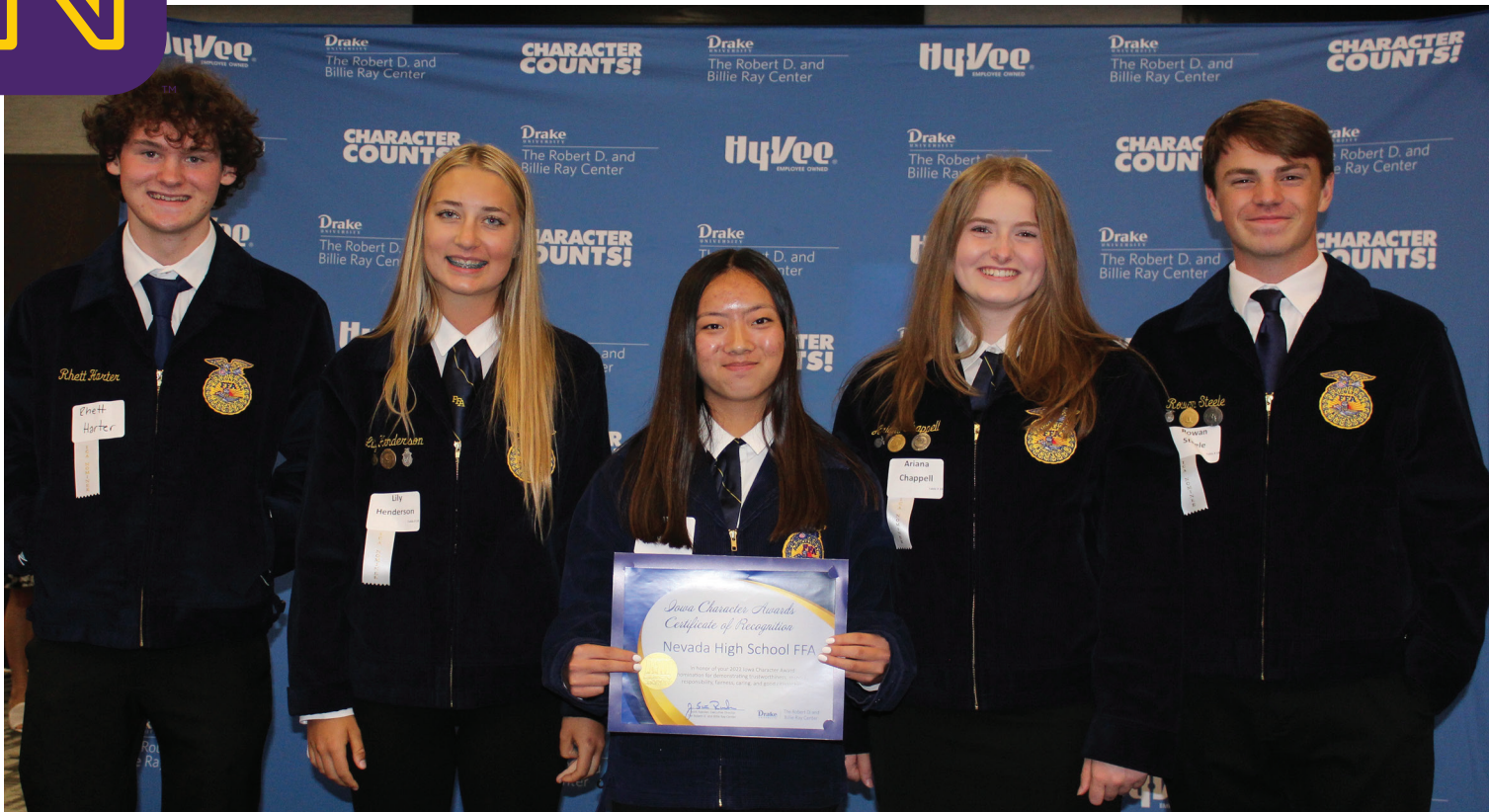


bring your financial contribution to ending world hunger to the walk on Oct. 2.

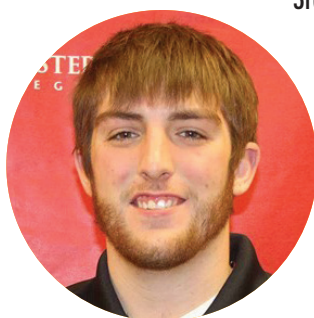

Historic Camelot Receives National Recognition



This past June, the Camelot Theater Foundation was awarded a \$200,000 Iowa Downtown Housing Grant to use on the rehabilitation of the apartments and the front façade.

An article in the September edition of the National Fire Sprinkler Magazine highlights efforts at the Camelot Theater. The article is written by Nevada Fire Chief Ray Reynolds. The article focuses on the work of installing a building sprinkler system in the two theater apartments on the second and third floors of the structure.

Last used prior to the 1970s, the apartments will be fully rehabilitated and remodeled to create two, one-bedroom downtown living spaces. To bring these apartments back to a usable condition, a sprinkler system was recommended.

The Camelot Theater Foundation is partnering with a neighboring building owner to connect elements of two remodeling projects. They want to utilize a large water riser pipe that the neighboring building owner installed during the 2020-21 street construction project to supply water to the sprinkler system. This pipe would allow for three buildings to potentially have sprinkler systems

installed, vastly broadening the future use of the second floors and allowing for code acceptable egress with fewer alterations to the buildings.

The National Fire and Sprinkler Magazine is a publication of the National Fire Sprinkler Association (NFSA), a 118-year-old organization established to help provide education and show the benefits of sprinkler systems in buildings across the nation. In 2020, the NFSA held a first-of-its-kind web training in Nevada, connecting experts in the industry from across the nation. The training highlighted the efforts of Main Street revitalization and offered ways to make historic downtown buildings more fire safe. This training was watched by people from dozens of communities, and helped share the story of Main Street Nevada.
