Plan ahead to enjoy the 4th of July in Nevada

The Nevada American Legion invites the public to take part in Nevada's 4th of July activities on Tuesday, July 4. A parade begins at 10 a.m. The parade route is on 6th Street, starting at E Avenue and going north to N Avenue.

Those wishing to be in the parade can gather along E Avenue, between 7th and 9th streets starting at 9:15 a.m. There is no fee to be in the parade, however everyone must fill out a liability waiver prior to the start of the parade. Pick up a form at the Main Street Nevada Office ahead of time or fill out the waiver the day of the parade.

Immediately following the parade, the Annual Chicken & Noodle Dinner will be served at the American Legion dining hall, 1331 6th St. Cost of the dinner is \$10 per person A few more important rules about fireworks, as outlined in (\$5 for kids age 10 and under). In addition, Root Beer Floats will be served outside of the building, and cost is a free-will donation with proceeds going toward the City Fireworks program. Everyone is welcome to enjoy the meal and treats, which also include fresh-baked pies. The meal may be enjoyed at the Legion or carry-out is available.

A fireworks show will happen at dusk in Nevada. Fireworks are shot into the air eastward along 19th Street at the edge

of SCORE Park. Spectators can view them from the SCORE Park area and at other places in town with a good line of sight to the sky east of SCORE.

As for those who wish to enjoy fireworks of your own over the holidays, the City of Nevada does allow residents to shoot fireworks during the following dates and times only:

July 1-3 (Saturday-Monday): Fireworks can be discharged from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m.

July 4 (Tuesday): Fireworks can be discharged from Noon to 11 p.m.

the City Code, include:

• You must be 18 or older to discharge a DOT 1.4 class consumer firework without parental supervision.

 Any person discharging fireworks assumes RESPONSIBIL-ITY for their operation and the consequences thereof. Do not discharge them in a reckless manner or manner likely to cause death, injury, fire, or property damage.

Do not set off fireworks on a public street.

 Discharge fireworks only on property you own or property where the owner's consent has been given and the owner of the property is present.

> No one can discharge fireworks who is showing visible signs or is determined to be intoxicated or under the influence of a drug or narcotic.



Ushering in a New Era for Senior Care in Nevada

Story Medical breaks ground on new 59,000 square foot facility set to open in late 2024 At a ceremonial groundbreaking ceremony on May 2, members of Story Medical leadership and the Board of Trustees shared the vision for the new Senior Care facility to be located adjacent to the medical center, just south of Highway 30 on the east side of Nevada. That vision paints a picture of a facility that will transform what senior care in the area looks like.

When complete, the 59,000-square-foot Story Medical Senior Care will include 60 private rooms that are designed to provide a home-like feeling. From front porches to landscaped courtyards and more, there are an array of special touches providing a pleasurable living experience and a true sense of community.

"Senior Care has evolved significantly over the years," says Story Medical Senior Care Administrator Missy Opperman. "While the level of care provided in the more 'institutional' environments is adequate, older adults and their families expect more these days. The new Story Medical Senior Care is designed around the resident experience. We have gone to great lengths to create an environment that encourages our residents to remain active physically, mentally and socially."

In addition to private rooms and attractive spaces that encourage community, the facility includes memory care support, family gathering spaces, a therapy room, a communal dining area and more. Its location adjacent to the medical center is an added bonus.

"Our residents typically require the services of the medical center more frequently than older adults in an independent living or assisted living environment," Opperman says. "Having ready access to such comprehensive services greatly reduces the barriers presented by having to travel by bus or arrange private transportation for care. This is a huge benefit for residents and offers tremendous peace of mind for families."

Story Medical has offered Senior Care in Nevada since the opening of a long-term care unit in 1969. The service was expanded in 1977 and now occupies all of the former Story County Medical Center on the southern edge of downtown.

"We have a long history of providing exceptional care to seniors in this community," says Nate Thompson, Story Medical CEO. "This project represents a significant commitment to ensure we can continue to provide these vital services locally, long into the future. We have created an ambitious vision, and it is exciting to see it come together."

Recycle cellphones & other devices to help with gorilla habitat

A critical component in smartphones and other devices is a substance called coltan. Eighty percent of the world's supply of coltan is found directly in the center of gorilla habitat in the Congo. Mineral mining for

smartphones has fueled bloody conflicts and gorilla habitat loss. The best way you can reduce this impact is recycling old smartphones and limiting unnecessary upgrades to a new device.

Story County Conservation has partnered with the Blank Park Zoo and ECO-CELL to recycle your old smartphones (and iPad, tablets, mp3 players, handheld gaming systems, chargers, and device accessories). ECO-CELL is a nonprofit which reclaims the precious minerals found inside these devices. Recycling these items helps save endangered gorillas by reducing the demand for coltan while 100 percent of the proceeds from this project go directly toward reforestation in the Congo and care for rescued gorillas.



Capital Improvements Planning

The Story County Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) is a multi-year guide to the construction and/or improvement of county facilities and the acquisition of



equipment. Through the process of preparing and updating this CIP, the County meets the need for orderly maintenance of the County's physical assets. It is a planning tool and structured to illustrate Story County's long-range capital needs and to be used as an implementation tool for the acquisition, development, construction, maintenance, and renovation of public facilities, infrastructure, and capital equipment.

The CIP runs on a fiscal year (FY) basis beginning July 1st and ending June 30th, and defines projects on a five-year timeframe. The following project timeframes are identified in the CIP:

- •Year 1 FY 24: July 2023 June 2024
- •Year 2 FY 25: July 2024 June 2025
- •Year 3 FY 26: July 2025 June 2026
- •Year 4 FY 27: July 2026 June 2027
- •Year 5 FY 28: July 2027 June 2028

•Projects in the current FY cycle (FY23) are listed as Current Projects.

The CIP adopts the 5-Year Story County Secondary Road Construction Program, updated and adopted annually, by reference.

Find out more about floodplains in Story County, Iowa

When flooding occurs, flood waters don't stop flowing when they hit a city/county boundary. Floodplain maps, developed through the National Flood Insurance Program, recognize this. While individual jurisdictions have authority over areas within their boundaries, the same maps and information are used to inform decision makers.

To find out if your property is located in the "Special Flood Hazard Area" — the official name of the floodplain — these tools may help you.

• Visit the Story County Assessor's website at: www.storyassessor.org. Enter your address in the search box, and once the report comes up showing your property, click on the "map" icon in the upper left corner and turn on "FEMA Flood Data" in the legend.

• Another great resource to find an official flood map, access flood



hazard products, and understand flood risk is FEMA's Flood Map Service Center at: http://msc.fema.gov/portal. On this site, you can search by address and use other tools to find your property.

• Real-time flood information is provided by the stream and river sensors installed across the state of Iowa. If you're tracking progress of floodwaters, visit the Iowa Flood center IFIS tool at: http://ifis.iowafloodcen-

ter.org/ifis/.



Door-to-door peddlers can be found throughout the year, but spring and summer tend to

be the busiest season.

Typically, a peddler is someone "carrying or transporting goods or merchandise who sells or offers for sale for immediate delivery such goods or merchandise from house-to-house or upon a public street." Examples of a peddler are a person who is selling merchandise, candy, trinkets, and similar items. This is different from what is referred to as a solicitor.

A solicitor is someone who "asks or attempts to ask, from door-to-door, orders for commercial goods, wares, subscriptions, publications, periodicals, merchandise, or services to be delivered or fulfilled at a future date."

City of Nevada ordinance Chapter 122 covers the rules regarding peddlers

Peddlers, Solicitors & City Rules

Did you know you can prohibit peddlers and solicitors from knocking at the door? Place a "No Peddler or Solicitor" sign conspicuously by your main entrance. A violation of this, if convicted, is \$250 first offense. (City Ordinance 122.17)

and solicitors. The purpose of the ordinance is to protect our community against fraud, unfair competition, and intrusion into the privacy of our homes. Any peddler or solicitor found guilty of violating the ordinance is subject to a \$300 fine, first offense. (City Ordinance 122.06)

A City Permit indicates police have verified this person is who they claim to be. A permit is created for the person, not their company, not their supervisor, but the individual who is going door-to-door. A copy of the permit, showing the dates it is valid, is placed on the City website and Facebook. If a peddler comes to your door, ask the person to show you his or her City Permit. A peddler is required to have a permit, unless they fall into the following exceptions: "A person who contacts another person at his or her residence without a prior invite to procure support for or against or to solicit funds for patriotic, political, philanthropic, charitable, or religious purposes." So, for example, a political candidate and/or supporters are fine, as is the Girl Scout with her cookies.

Bicycle Safety Tips from the Nevada PSD

With the weather becoming warmer and more people out and about, the Nevada Public Safety Department would like to remind everyone of a few safety tips when out riding your bike.



 In warmer weather, you can easily forget to hydrate. Make sure before you do any exercise like bike riding, you hydrate.
Drinking water is the best thing you can do to stay hydrated.

• Wear light, loose clothing when riding your bike, this will reflect the sun's heat and the light weight of the clothing will help regulate your body temperature.

• Make sure your tires are properly inflated, your brakes work and your chains are tight and have proper lubrication. Any deficiencies with your bike can lead to possible injury. • If you ride in the roadway with traffic, follow all traffic laws. Do not ride your bike against traffic, ride with traffic.

- Make sure to wear a bike helmet, gloves, eye protection, and any other protective gear you see fit to put on before you ride your bike.
- If you ride your bike at night, be sure to wear reflective clothing or light-colored clothing. Do not wear dark clothing. Wearing dark clothing will make it very difficult for drivers to see you.
- If you ride on the street at night, make sure to have a white light to the front, and a red light or reflector to the rear. If drivers can see you better at night, it will reduce your likelihood of crash or injury.

If you have any other questions regarding bicycle safety, please stop by the Nevada Public Safety Department. We have officers certified and trained in bike patrol who can help you with your questions or with issues you may have concerning your bike. Thank you and ride safely!

Annual water rate increase on the July bill

The City increases water rates yearly at 3 percent to cover increasing costs combined with demand. The increase will be effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2023. A significant impact to these costs are chemicals. The City is also preparing for upgrades to the Water Plant in the next few years.

At this time there are no planned wastewater rate changes. The new wastewater facility is to be completed by 2024. Rates will be reviewed once operational costs of the new plant and bond payments are known.



The city would like to bring light to city ordinance 46.02: No person under the age of 16 years of age shall be on or remain in or upon any of the public streets, alleys, or public places in the City at night between the hours of 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. the following morning, unless such person is accompanied by his or her parent, guardian. Violation of this ordinance is subject to a fine of \$300. Repeat offenses are subject to a \$500 fine.


KELLY NAMED STATE FFA OFFICER
