MEDICAL REMINDERS FROM THE NURSES

Incoming Preschoolers: a completed immunization record and a current physical exam before school starts.

Incoming Kindergartners: a dental screening certificate (no earlier than age 3) and a student vision card/ form.

The vision card/form should be performed no earlier than one year prior to enrollment. If your child had their eyes screened here at school through the Iowa KidSight program this last January, you do not need another evaluation for kindergarten. **Incoming 3rd Graders:** a student vision card/form which should be performed no earlier than one year prior to enrollment.

Incoming 7th Graders: all students entering 7th grade must have proof of TDAP (Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis) and Meningococcal Vaccines before school starts in the fall. Medical or Religious waiver will be accepted if signed by the physician and/or notarized.

Incoming 9th Graders: Iowa law requires that all 9th grade students provide proof of a dental screening. Any screening from 8th grade or a dental screening while in 9th grade will be accepted.

Incoming 12th Graders: seniors

will need proof of a second Meningococcal vaccine, done after the age of 16 years. First dose was required for 7th grade.

Sports Physicals: all 7-12 students participating in sports will need a yearly sports physical. Physicals are good for 13 months and need to be signed and dated by the health care provider and parent.

Any student with a food allergy can fill out the Diet Modification Request Form. This will need to be signed by the health care provider and parent.

Nevada Food at First ARPA Check Presentation

Story County received \$18.9 million in total funding from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. In spring 2021, knowing that

funds must be obligated by the end of 2024 and spent by the end of 2026, the Board of Supervisors designed an approach to solicit input on the best use of the funding, accepted applications and approved projects. Throughout the summer of 2021, Story County reflected on specific community needs and lessons learned to date in pandemic response and recovery, asking the community for input. Nevada Food at First is one sub-recipient of ARPA dollars. They are a non-profit organization that prepares, packages and delivers an average of 200 meals every Monday and Thursday to Nevada and eastern Story County families and individuals who are food insecure. The Story County Board of Supervisors funded \$45,650 to Nevada Food at First to promote nutritional security and help increase the amount of meals being provided.

BURKE GIVES \$50,000 TOWARD NEW FIRE ENGINE FOR THE NEVADA FIRE DEPARTMENT

Burke Corp., a subsidiary of Hormel Foods Corporation, a Fortune 500 global-branded food company, announced they will be donating \$50,000 to the fire department to help fund the purchase of a new fire engine. City Reminder

Annual Water Rate Increase

You will notice your annual rate increase on your July utility bill.

The City increases water rates yearly at 3 percent to cover increasing costs combined with demand. The increase will be effective for bills due on and after July 1, 2023. A significant impact to these costs are chemicals. The City is also preparing for upgrades to the Water Plant in the next few years.

At this time there are no planned wastewater rate changes. The new wastewater facility is to be completed by 2024. Rates will be reviewed once operational costs of the new plant and bond payments are known.

Lots of projects are happening on Main Street

There are a number of construction projects being worked on inside many buildings in our downtown — from apartments, to a restaurant, to converting a former bank into a retail space! As Nevada

to converting a former bank into a retail space! As Nevada currently has a housing shortage, let's first talk about how some downtown projects are helping!

The Tipton Building — A room with a view!

The bright red building with the beautiful turret, on the corner of 6th and K, houses Allen L. Kockler Co. on the ground level, as well as the Lunar Parlor tattoo shop. The second floor has been empty for a long time. Owners Jon and Katie Augustus and Al and Kathy Kock-



ler decided to put the empty space to use to help with our housing shortage. The project, which received a grant, has taken a little longer than planned due to the pandemic. But, the wait will be worth it when tenants live in a space with beautiful exposed brick walls and a view over the downtown. When the project finishes this fall, four living spaces will be available.

The Camelot Theater — Live amongst the 'Stars'

Did you know the historic Camelot theater has two apartments on the upper level? While they haven't been lived in for quite some time, that will change soon. Work on these apartments started earlier this year, with the help of a downtown housing grant. Remodeling the apartments to make them into livable spaces is one phase of a larger project for



the theater. If you haven't seen the renderings, stop and check them out while attending one of their concerts, open mic night, or monthly Sunday movies (see page 16 calendar)! Owned by the Camelot Theater Foundation, this project is being overseen by volunteers.

The Old Hotel — A place once bustling with overnight guests

The building on the SE corner of 6th and J, owned by Bluemoon Properties, was an old hotel back in its day and is lovingly referred to by present-day owners as The Grand Old Lady Hotel. While the ground level of this building houses several businesses, the second and third stories are being renovated for apartment living. Currently, three apartments are occupied. Once restoration of all of the apartments is complete, the old hotel will have 11 apartments. The owners

estimate this project will take several years, but they will be actively pursuing tenants as each apartment remodel is finished.

E.B. Patten Block — The aroma of fresh baked donuts and popcorn!

This building on the NE corner of 6th and K, better known today as Bricktown for its storefront businesses, has four apartments on the second story. Building owners, Mike and Paula Feltner, are working to update the apartments, as well as make some exterior improvements. They, too, received a grant for these updates. Given the owners' eye for details, we have no doubt the apartments will also be aesthetically pleasing when they are completed next year. And, new tenants will have the luxury of walking downstairs to get donuts for breakfast!

Simply put, our providers, nurses and staff are focused on dedicating all the time it takes to fully understand patient concerns—from the registration desk right through your appointment—and to develop a plan to address them. In preparation for your next visit to your provider, here are some tips to keep in mind to ensure you get the most out of the appointment:

- Be prepared. If you have questions, write them down in advance and ask your healthcare provider or his/her nurse.
- Make certain your provider participates with your health insurance plan. Going to a clinic that does not

participate with your plan can be costly. Please verify with your health insurance plan to see if our providers participate in your plan.

- If you're seeing the provider for the first time, be sure to have your medical records sent to his/her office (or to you) well ahead of your appointment.
- If you are on any medications, write them down and bring your list with you.
- If you don't understand something, don't be afraid to ask for another explanation.
 It is your responsibility to understand your medical options and make decisions with your provider.
- It's a good idea to have another family member with you when talking with your provider. Having another listener can relieve stress and help you remember more.

If you don't have a primary healthcare provider, it's always a good idea to establish care, even if you're not sick. Story Medical Clinics are currently taking new patients.
