

Raising charitable giving awareness is the goal of new annual campaign

As we celebrate a current "season of giving" with the holidays ahead, members of The Nevada Foundation introduce a new campaign — starting in 2024 — which is all about giving.

"When we established the Foundation, a key priority was to foster a culture of philanthropy in Nevada," said Mayor Brett Barker, current president of The Nevada Foundation. "We know there are many great organizations doing incredible work, and our goal is to aid them in their missions to serve Nevada." barely making it, or not making it. There are many families working numerous jobs and still barely making it." Heeren said we have families living in unsafe environments, because it's what they can afford.

And if they can barely afford housing, then for many families, food insecurity and other basic needs are also factors. "There are more children and families being served by Cubbies Cupboard, the weekend food program, Food at First and the Community Cupboard than we have

To do this, members of The Nevada Foundation divided the calendar year by quarters, and in each three-month period, they will focus on different charitable needs in our community. For example, quarter one is "Helping Hands," and the focus will be on food, clothing, and shelter needs, and supporting the organizations that concentrate on these types of needs.

In the diagram that accompanies this campaign and this story, you can see the focuses of the other three quarters of the year.

Looking at just the first quarter, Nevada School District employees Elizabeth Gindt and Jodi Heeren, who work with students and families in

Gindt said, "My guess would be most community members do not know we are working daily with, and connecting families to, area resources."

The agencies that are helping to meet the needs of families include, according to Gindt, all of the following: Food at First, Kids at First, Boys and Girls Club, Cubbie's Cupboard, The Bridge Home, The Community Cupboard, Harmony Clothing Closet, The Mobile Crisis Unit, NCRC, and The Nevada Human Service Fund, plus others who provide funds and scholarships to help cover needs.

With Seasons of Giving, people can give to the Ne-


need, can attest to just how important it is for the community to provide "Helping Hands" support in the areas of food, clothing, and shelter.

"I feel at this time, our school district is mirroring the broader social issues facing families across the nation," Gindt said. "There are consistent issues arising in the area of basic needs."

Even in a community as vibrant as Nevada appears to be, Heeren said poverty is an issue. "Some families are

Fill the Foyer to return for 9th year

Fill the Foyer 2024 will start on Tuesday, Jan. 2, when City offices re-open after the New Year's holiday. During Fill the Foyer, which runs through Wednesday, Jan. 31, residents are invited to bring in donations of money and/or non-perishable food items, cleaning supplies, toiletries, and "winter gear."

Items collected are given to Harmony Clothing Closet, Nevada Community Cupboard, Cubbie's Cupboard, and Nevada Food at First, entities that help families in need within our community.

When it comes to wearable items, Harmony is asking people to donate only "winter gear" during Fill the Foyer. This includes hats, gloves, coats, snow boots, snow pants, and scarves. If you have clothing and other items, those may be dropped off directly to Harmony during regular Monday evening hours.

This year, Food at First is asking for the following donations:

2-gallon zipper storage bags, 1-gallon zipper *freezer* bags, quart zipper *freezer* bags, zipper sandwich bags, and full-size aluminum steam table pans and lids.

Items may be dropped off in the City Hall foyer during regular business hours, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. weekdays. If you are bringing in a cash donation, please leave it with one of our City Hall employees in the administrative office.

Fill the Foyer started as a way of keeping the "giving" spirit surrounding the holidays going for an extended time period.

Seasons Of Giving, as you can read about on pages 4-5 in this publication, will also focus on helping families with these same types of needs, and is the focus of the campaign during the first three months of this year.

"It's all about giving and helping families in our community who need assistance," said Mayor Brett Barker, who started Fill the Foyer nine years ago.

Deals on older books and more help 'Friends' support the library

The biggest fundraisers for the Friends of the Library, according to current Friends board president Maryann Ryan, are the monthly book sales, held in the library's basement.

If you've ever been to a Friends of the Library book sale, you know the sale offers more than just books. Book sales also offer puzzles, games, DVDs, CDs, and audiobooks. All items are sold for \$1.

The book sales have lots of loyal customers. Among them are Mitch and Connie Gronemeyer of Ames. Mitch is a retired automation control worker, and Connie is a retired school cook. They both love to read. Mitch said he loves histories and biographies. Connie loves the authors, Patterson and Sanford. She also likes puzzles and often buys one or two at the sales.

"We love getting home with a full bag of books to read," Mitch said. The couple reads and enjoys, and then donates a big bag of books back to the sales, so they can be sold again. Kris and Debbie Corbin were present at a recent library book sale. Kris, a retired school teacher who is active in the Nevada Community Historical Society, said he's always looking for anything that deals with Iowa's history. Debbie looks for a very different type of book.

Addressing Addiction with Billion Pill Pledge

Providers, Surgical Services team recognized for efforts aimed at reducing abuse of prescription pills.

At a recent press conference, Iowa Attorney General Brenna Bird and Story County Medical Center proudly announced their participation in the Billion Pill Pledge program, launched in conjunction with Goldfinch Health.

Surgery has long been known as a gateway to long-term opioid painkiller use and dependence. Studies show approximately 9% of surgery patients who have never used an opioid become long-term users of opioids after being legally prescribed opioids after a surgery.

"My greatest hope for all of this, which I think is well within reach, is this: that Iowa can lead the way to show other states how you can have a great hospital like this that's doing a great job with patient care. There was no problem here. But, you can take the best and you can make it even better," Attorney General Bird says.

The mission of the Billion Pill Pledge is to reduce leftover opioids after surgery in the United States by 1 billion pills each year, thereby avoiding those pills being possibly diverted to unauthorized use by others.

Through the Billion Pill Pledge program, Story County Medical Center has enhanced its surgery protocols and optimized pain management around surgery. These industry-leading approaches are designed to enhance patients' preparation for surgery, better manage any surgery-related pain, and minimize opioid use both before and after surgery.

"We are excited to launch this critical first dose prevention program at our hospital," says Nate Thompson, Story Medical CEO. "Opioid challenges are not just patient challenges. They are community challenges. The Billion Pill Pledge program will help us to better serve our community."

As a part of this program, patients will receive a "Prepared for Surgery" care package prior to surgery. This box includes a number of items key to optimizing a patient's surgery experience, including an opioid disposal bottle, pre-surgery drink, ice packs and more. Nurses from Goldfinch Health are supporting patients during the critical period before and after surgery to help increase the use of opioidminimizing surgery protocols.

"The support provided by Goldfinch Health is critical to our success in optimizing patient care, especially when our resources are stretched," says Cathy Haley, RN, Director of Outpatient Clinic & Surgical Services at Story Medical. "This program means our patients have access to the resources they need to confidently prepare for and successfully recover from surgery."

Goldfinch Health is an Iowa Citybased company dedicated to enhancing surgical outcomes, improving the surgery experience for patients, and reducing opioid use. Late last year, Goldfinch Health launched the Billion Pill Pledge an opioid first dose prevention program.

Breaking Ground

CUTTING EDGE PAINTING CELEBRATES A NEW HOME FOR OPERATIONS IN NEVADA

On Sept. 27, Cutting Edge Painting broke ground on a new facility in Nevada that will be home to their operations when it opens in 2024.

The event was commemorated with a ceremony led by the Nevada Economic Development Council (NEDC) and included representation from the City of Nevada. Mike Wiezorek, owner of Cutting Edge Painting, and others, provided remarks that highlighted the unique partnerships between organizations across the community that made this project come together.

City of Nevada Mayor Brett Barker noted that he loves watching local businesses grow and expand. "This is a great example of that," said Barker. "We're really excited about the project



here and together for what it will do for the community."

Cutting Edge Painting is a professional paint company and epoxy floor coating company that services central lowa. From residential interior and exterior, commercial jobs, epoxy flooring, and more, they do it all. Wiezorek noted that Cutting Edge has grown steadily over the past several years and currently employs just over 30 people.

The land is located in the Nevada West Industrial Park and was previously owned by the NEDC. The NEDC sold it to Cutting Edge for this project. Brenda Dryer, NEDC Executive Director, said, "It was our pleasure to work with the City of Nevada and Cutting Edge Painting to make this project a reality."

The new facility will be home to the company's entire operation and allow for continued growth in Nevada and across Central Iowa. In his final remarks, Wiezorek thanked the NEDC and City of Nevada for their support of the project. "We've searched other properties, other places, and other cities, and we're excited to be able to stay here and put our roots down."

Nevada FFA harvest yields results

The Nevada FFA Chapter finished harvesting last month. The program yielded 8,072 bushels of corn, and 308 bushels of soybeans.

After harvest, a fall application of anhydrous ammonia was applied to help next year's corn have the nitrogen it needs to thrive.



Verbio recently communicated interest in harvesting stover from the FFA corn fields which would provide additional income for the chapter.

A cover crop of rye was seeded in September on one corn field. Winter cover crops are grown off-season to reduce soil compaction, help prevent erosion, aid in suppressing weeds and pests, and boost soil fertility.

Any renewals received after that date will incur a \$5 penalty per vehicle. To save taxpayer dollars, the Recorder's Office is no longer mailing courtesy reminders to recreational vehicle owners. Please provide a current e-mail address when renewing to ensure you receive a courtesy e-mail reminder each year.

In addition to the registration, all snowmobiles operated on public land must display a separate user permit. This permit can be purchased at the Recorder's Office as well as several other vendors throughout Story County.

Story County Organizational Strategic Plan for 2024 to 2029

In the spring of 2023 the Story County Board of Supervisors invited leadership across all County offices and departments to participate in developing a new strategic plan to serve as the County's priority and resource road map over the next five years.

Input was gathered through a survey to identify strengths, opportunities, and weaknesses. Those involved then met in two, half-day planning sessions to identify priorities which were aligned to the County's mission and values. This work led the County to six focus areas:

1) Community wellbeing

2) Quality of life infrastructure

3) Recruitment, development and retention of Story County team members

4) Communication and information on services and programs

5) Leveraging technology

6) Fiscal responsibility

As the County looks ahead to the



next five years, these action steps will guide and inform program and budgetary decisions. They will be the foundation for how different functions within county government work together under a shared vision, to achieve consistent and measurable progress for the benefit of all people in Story County.

Memorial Day planning group needs younger generations to help

The Nevada Patriotic Council puts on an exceptional Memorial Day observance for our community every May. But this dedicated group of volunteers desperately needs new members, especially those from a younger generation.

"We have members of this group who are in their 90s," said Sue McCaskey, who at age 67 is one of, if not the youngest member of the Patriotic Council.

On Memorial Day of 2015, Sue got involved with the group because her father, Louie, was failing in his health and was still the person in charge of lining up all of the cars for the procession. "I could tell he was struggling, so I went over to help him," Sue said. Then on May 1, 2016, Louie died, and with Memorial Day just 30 days away, Sue decided to take his spot on the Council. She has stayed on ever since.

Louie was one of the military veteran members of the Council; there are a few. But Sue makes it clear that being a veteran isn't a requirement. "We just need people who really want to show our veterans and active military personnel their appreciation," she said.

The Nevada Patriotic Council has one job: Memorial Day — planning for it and carrying it out. Those on the Patriotic Council have about five or six meetings a year, all occurring between February and the end of May.

"We have some pretty intense meetings for two or three of those, when we're trying to get everything set up and make decisions about who our dignitaries will be," Sue said.

They then get busy on the weekend of Memorial Day, which includes finding volunteers to help put up flags and serve a breakfast for all the volunteers on that Saturday. They appreciate contributions from Fareway and Dollar Fresh this past year for the breakfast, Sue noted. She said flags are put up in both the City Municipal Cemetery and the Catholic Cemetery.

"We are quickly approaching flag capacity," Sue added. She explains that every flag put up in the cemeteries represents a veteran from this area. All of those veterans are

listed on the program, another task of the Council which has been efficiently handled for many years by Linda Beem. "This means we're going to soon need to find more places for flag poles," Sue said. "We don't want to discourage anybody from having a flag put up, because we want all of our veterans to be represented."

The Sunday of Memorial Day weekend has just a few small tasks, and then the work of putting on the service happens Monday morning.

"We have a member who gets the sound system ready at the cemetery, and this past year, we were fortunate to have Dane Nealson do our sound at the Story County Administration building. That was really nice," she said. There is also set up at the cemetery. Chairs are provided by Justin Rasmusson, owner of the local funeral home. "We are thankful for him giving us the chairs to use."

The Council invites those going into the military to be honored at the early service in front of the administration building, where there is also a flag raising.

As the procession that morning takes dignitaries of the day to the City Cemetery, Sue said Council members help get everyone seated for the main services there.

"On Memorial Day, I get goosebumps. It makes my heart swell," Sue said of all the flags, the wonderful attendance of community members, the young people in the high school band, and the beauty of the Nevada Municipal Cemetery. "Nevada probably has one of the most beautiful cemeteries I've ever been in, and our City Parks and Rec Department does such a marvelous job getting it ready." The beautiful, sunny Memorial Days provide the best memories and the biggest goosebumps, but Sue noted that the Council also works with the Story County Fair Association to be sure the nearby Community Building or Christy Hall are available in case of inclement weather. "They're always wonderful to give us that option as a backup," she said.

The present members of the Patriotic Council want to be sure the tradition of Nevada's Memorial Day observance continues for generations to come. "The biggest thing we need immediate help with is people with the muscle to do things like putting up and taking down flags," Sue said. The local Boy Scouts are always great helpers, but they can't do it all. "A lot of our Patriotic Council members can't lift and do all of the things they used to do."

If you can't attend the meetings, but would like to serve on the Council by being part of the weekend preparations, Sue said, that too, is an option.

"There are many ways to be involved," she said. "If people have an interest, they can attend one of our meetings to see what we are all about and then make a decision."

Sue said she often thinks back to the tragedy of 9-11 and the days that followed. "We were all so patriotic... We need those patriots now. We're open to new ideas. We just need people with a desire to present a program that is dedicated to our veterans and to eulogize the ones who have gone before."
