"Preparing Students Today for Tomorrow" remains the mission statement of the Nevada Community School District. However, the experiences provided to students have changed over the past decade. In addition to reaching the "finish line" (graduation), the district has prioritized providing students with personalized learning opportunities that prepares learners for life after high school. We aim to ensure each individualized learner engages in creative and critical thinking experiences while remaining flexible and continuously adapting as their learning needs change. Our faculty and staff are committed to having a student-first mentality while providing all students with a safe, supportive, and positive learning environment.

The Career Occupation Related Experiences (CORE) program at Nevada High School exemplifies the district's focus on preparing students for life after high school. CORE allows students at Nevada High School to participate in work-based learning experiences that prioritize students who graduate high school and are both college and career-ready. Engaging in quality work-based learning opportunities allows our students to gain experiences that will make them better informed about potential careers of interest to them, better qualified to apply for those careers, and ultimately allow them to demonstrate and apply the knowledge and skills they have learned while attending the Nevada Community School District.

Through the CORE program, high school students have multiple pathways to experience work-based learning and explore careers of interest to them while still in high school. CORE also provides ongoing support as students explore and learn about career opportunities of interest to them that are available within central lowa. Collaboration between the district and community partners leads to a mutually beneficial work-based learning experience for our students and community. CORE offers work-based learning experiences through Service Learning (Silver Cord Hours, Dr. Heather Ludwig Day of Service, and LAUNCH), Business Internships, Student Enterprise, Pre-Apprenticeships, and Registered Apprenticeship opportunities.

The Nevada Community School District has two Registered Apprenticeship opportunities for juniors or seniors at Nevada High School. The district partners with ALMACO and PMI through the Welding Apprenticeship, and ALMACO is the sole partner through the Industrial Manufacturing Technician (agriculture emphasis) Apprenticeship. Through the Registered Apprenticeship program and other work-based learning opportunities within CORE, we are committed to creating meaningful learning experiences to actively engage all learners and ensure we prepare Students Today for Tomorrow.

### **NEVADA FFA ATTENDS LEGISLATIVE SYMPOSIUM**

FFA members from across lowa converged on the lowa State Capitol in Des Moines to build character and promote citizenship, volunteerism, and patriotism. More than 700 high school students from 118 schools visited

the Iowa State Capitol **Building in Des Moines** at the end of January, including 8 students from Nevada, as part of the 39th Annual Iowa FFA Legislative Symposium and FFA Day at the Capitol.



Students visited with legislators, exhibited skills learned in the agriculture classroom, and learned the importance of citizenship.

In the morning, FFA members gathered and enjoyed a brief message from Lt. Governor Adam Gregg, who then presented the FFA Week Proclamation which officially declares Feb. 17-24 as FFA Week in Iowa. The morning program also provided opportunities for FFA members to hear from Mike Naig, Iowa Secretary of Agriculture, about the importance of agriculture in Iowa and abroad.

Nevada students also met with State Representative Dave Deyoe, and Josie Kelly, North Central State FFA Vice-President.



Seventeen-year-old Nevada High School senior Jack Condon (pictured) is making the most of his last year in high school.

Thanks to the "registered apprenticeship" program offered through a partnership between the Nevada Community School District, DMACC, and the Department of Labor, Condon is working as an industrial manufacturing technician apprentice at ALMACO.

"We have two welders who have worked through the apprentice program, but Jack is our first industrial manufacturing technician apprentice," said Ellen Hines, Human Resources Manager for ALMACO.

Condon describes himself as someone who has always liked working with his hands, so this apprenticeship fits him well.

"I'm working in the service department, fixing combines, tractors, and the like," he said. When machinery comes in, Condon said the first thing he usually does is give the piece a good cleaning. After that, he could be putting on parts, painting parts, doing oil changes, changing filters, making hydraulic repairs, replacing hoses and batteries ... whatever is needed of him.

At ALMACO, Condon reports to Zac Frederick, Central Service Supervisor. "Jack is a meaningful and valued member of the service team, and everyone likes Jack," Frederick said. "He has grown so much since he started, and gained a lot of confidence in his work."

Condon started the apprenticeship this past summer, working full-time hours until school started. With school in session, he's worked afternoons at ALMACO, which is basically the equivalent of three school class periods.

He said the school/work balance has worked well for him. He also likes that he is paid for his time at ALMACO.

"Really, I get to learn a lot of stuff that, if I hadn't been doing this apprenticeship, I'd probably have had to pay for it," Condon said, "and instead, I get to learn hands on and make money."

A specific skill Condon worked on in his position at ALMACO is the use of a torque wrench, and the importance of not over or under tightening fasteners. In fact, he said, it was when using a torque wrench that he realized one of the most important life lessons this apprenticeship is teaching him asking for help.

"If you try to keep working at something, and it's really not working, it's better to ask for help so you're not wasting your time."

Condon's future plans are to pursue a career in mechanics, and eventually work for the Iowa Department of Transportation to help maintain its fleet. "I'd like to stay at ALMACO for another two to three years," he said. He is also considering the pursuit of a diesel mechanics degree from DMACC.


To be able to step into his present apprenticeship, Condon noted that he has taken two years of ag mechanics at Nevada High School. He's also presently taking a welding course, offered by DMACC at Nevada High School. That course is taught by Dustin Johns, who is Condon's advisor for the registered apprenticeship program.

Outside of school, Condon, who is the son of Ryan and Marilyn Condon, has been active in the Scouting program in Nevada, working his way up to Eagle Scout. If you visit Robison Wildlife Acres, south of Nevada, vou'll see some of Condon's work

dle of it all in Central Service. "You don't see people his age in that kind of job every day."

In addition to Condon, ALMACO employs several other students who are or were apprentices through different programs:

- Caelin Tscherter is a welder fabricator who started as a welding apprentice
- Kyler Clark is a welder fabricator who started as a welding apprentice
- Kamryn Linder is a production welder who is working part-time while attending school

ALMACO has been happy to give hard-working students the opportunity to learn more through various school to work opportunities.

Chief Solutions Officer and one of ALMACO's owners, Christian Clem, said he met Jack during his interview and is excited to see Jack in the midCondon encourages younger students to think about this possibility. "It's a really good opportunity, and you'll get experience with a company that makes stuff here in town. ALMACO makes pretty specialized equipment, so you'll learn both general and specialized things, giving you the ability to work on a lot of machines."

# Contain your pets as you get out this spring

The Nevada Parks and Recreation Department reminds pet owners of a few simple courtesies when utilizing the City's sidewalks and trails, and when making visits to our City parks and City cemetery with your pets.

Please be sure to pick up after your pets with a pet waste bag. We have pet waste bag stations placed at most entrances to the City's trail system. If you do not bring a bag with you, please take one of ours.

Pets must be restrained at all times. Failure to restrain your pet may result in a citation as outlined in the City of Nevada's Municipal Code of Ordinances. This is a safety issue for all park users,



as well as for each pet.

Pets are not to be let out on any of our sports playing fields. The Parks and Rec staff works very hard to provide quality athletic fields for our community sporting events. Kids, coaches, and spectators involved in these activities deserve a clean and sanitary venue for

their activities.

Finally, dogs are allowed in the cemetery if they remain on a leash and stay on the roadways. At no time shall anyone allow their dog to run at-large in the cemetery. We have pet waste bag stations at the cemetery for you to use, if needed.

Everyone likes to have positive outdoor experiences and enjoy clean environments. Please be a responsible pet owner so everyone can enjoy Nevada's outdoor public spaces.






### MIDWEST AUTHOR TALK: TIM GROVER

# Local people, programs, projects receive Ames Chamber 'Impact' awards

### NEVADA FIFID HOUSF — FCONOMIC IMPACT **AWARD**

The Nevada Field House is a community development project, focused on many wellness and recreation functions used for multi-generational activities and events. It is located north of the Fawcett Family Aquatic Center in the SCORE park and has been creatively dubbed "SCORE INDOOR."

This facility houses a gymnasium space, a children's indoor play area, an elevated walking/running track, flex space courts, turf areas, batting cages, social space, a multi-purpose area, and the offices of the City's Parks and Recreation Department.

The \$7.7 million community development project was funded with \$4.5 million from the City of Nevada, \$450,000 from the State of Iowa, and \$400,000 from Story County. The remaining \$2.4 million came from individuals and businesses from across the region.

In February, the highly anticipated 55,000-square-foot Nevada Field House opened to the public.

### FILIMMEREFIT — HOUSING IMPACT AWARD

Flummerfelt Enterprises is a generational business in Story County, and currently operates eight manufactured home communities between Ames and Nevada, serving more than 900 families.

In 2022, Flummerfelt Enterprises purchased the Homemakers Mobile Home Park in East Nevada. The park was in great disrepair and a concern for the City of Nevada. Today the park is known as Sunridge Estates. In partnership with the City of Nevada, many upgrades have been made, with more than 30 old, dilapidated homes having been removed and

some now replaced with new homes. The roads inside the park have been paved. The community has become a sense of pride to those who live there.

### NEVADA IJAG — BUSINESS & STUDENT **ENGAGEMENT**

Iowa Jobs for America's Graduates, otherwise known as iJAG, is a program provided in some schools to help students develop career readiness, including leadership skills, training, career education, and employer engagement.

Working with the Nevada Economic Development Council, the Nevada program, taught by Tanner Koder, started a workforce committee that collaborated on a Career Day and College Fair, along with a Business Etiquette luncheon over the past year. With just those two events, all seniors who graduated through the iJAG program have successfully secured jobs. The collaboration between the school district and those who are investing in the community has been successful, and we look forward to many more years of this partnership.

### MID-STATES — ECONOMIC IMPACT AWARD

Mid-States Companies manufactures grain material handling systems, structural support metal fabrication for towers, catwalks, and balconies. Their customers are located across the country in ag sectors.

In 2023, Mid-States Companies began construction on their new Corporate Headquarters and expansion of their manufacturing area. The project will result in the creation of new jobs and support the company's projected growth over the next five to 10 years in Nevada.




# **ARC** Award accepted by Tricia Crain of Nevada

# A Unique Perspective on Mental Health Care

New provider takes holistic approach to help patients 'feel like themselves'

It was in seventh grade that Jena Weissenburger, ARNP, PMHNP-BC, decided she was going to dedicate her career to helping those struggling with mental health. Today, she has realized the goal she formulated at such a young age, caring for patients as a member of the team at Central Iowa Psychological Services (CIPS).

Weissenburger works alongside CIPS providers Daniel Bench, MSN, PMHNP-BC; and Emily Loynachan, LISW, to provide counseling and medication management services at Story Medical Clinic - Nevada.

According to Weissenburger, the unique perspective shaped by her experiences dealing with severe inattention as a child prove valuable in her practice.

"I struggled," she recalls. "It was so bad that there were times doing my schoolwork where I would read the same page five times and be in tears because I couldn't remember anything. After trying for years to work with the school systems and figure out why I was having such a hard time, I finally saw a provider."

It took a significant amount of time, along with some trial and error, before Weissenburger began to see some progress. The journey served as a driving force for her to

explore more than just medication, including integrative medicine, and things like incorporating exercise, diet, herbs, and supplements in managing her condition.

The insight she gained continues to guide her practice today. At Story Medical, she primarily offers medication management services for those six years of age and older. Weissenburger takes special delight in working with school-aged children and credits her playful personality for helping her connect with kids.

"Being able to play with them while talking to them to try and get them to build that rapport is at the heart of my practice," Weissenburger says.

She also has specialized training in serving women experiencing perinatal and postpartum depression and mood disorders.

Across the spectrum of her patients, she takes an approach that is holistic, recognizing that mental health care is not one-size-fits-all. She combines medication management with therapy, being careful to explore any options that might lead to a breakthrough for her patients, including nutrition, exercise, supplements and more.

In addition, Weissenburger says collaborative care

is integral to her practice. She maintains close communication with primary care providers at Story Medical Clinic. At CIPS she works together with her peers to ensure patients are receiving the best in care. Together the trio serving patients at Story Medical Clinic - Nevada is committed to ending the stigma around mental health services and helping patients get back to feeling good.

"About half of people take meds to address a mental health issue," Weissenburger says. "It's not a big deal. In my practice, I want to help enhance who you are. I want you to have the better life, even while you may still be working on things. I want my patients to be comfortable and to feel like themselves."

In helping her patients, Weissenburger says she finds a special kind of joy.

"Seeing people get better, seeing people stop struggling, whether it's work, school, being a mom, being a dad, provides a tremendous sense of satisfaction."



# **Connect with Main Street Nevada**


Main Street Nevada has been in existence for four years. In this short time, we have already seen the benefits of this program to a town like Nevada. The grant programs have allowed us the ability to rehab two buildings, with three more to be completed this year. Our Design Committee has dressed up our downtown with light pole banners and planters. Our Economic Vitality committee has offered classes for businesses.

But possibly the best thing Main Street Nevada is doing happens behind the scenes, where our volunteer-driven organization is really good at making connections. Connections between business owners, connections for community organizations, connections from outsiders to a Nevada business, etc. We have connected job seekers and hiring employers, connected tenants to landlords and connected a business owner with an idea that fills a void in the community.

# Story County Housing Trust plans to build house in Nevada

The Story County Housing Trust (SCHT) is a 501c3 non-profit organization with the goal of improving affordable housing in Story County. Since its inception in 2017, the efforts of the SCHT have been focused on providing funds to organizations that are actively involved in affordable housing activities across Story County.

When American Rescue Plan funding was made available by the Story County Board of Supervisors, the SCHT Board elected to pursue funding to expand their affordable housing activities. The SCHT was successful in an application to the Board of Supervisors for funding to construct a Homes for lowa house.

Homes for Iowa houses are built by Iowa Prison Industries in Newton and are transported to the site nearly complete. At the site, the house is placed on a basement and connections to utilities are made. After placement, sitebuilt structures like the garage and deck

are constructed. The result is a new, affordable home.

The Homes for Iowa program produces an affordable house and also provides training in a trade for the members participating in the program. The mission of Homes for Iowa is to provide state-of-the-art building trades training and re-entry employment assistance to reduce recidivism while constructing quality homes for sale to Iowans across the state.

In Nevada, with help from the NEDC, a site was identified at the corner of D Avenue and 10th Street. The house for this site will be a 1,200-square-foot, 3-bedroom 3-bath, with an attached

garage. Delivery is expected in late April. Shown with this story are renderings of the house and the floorplan.

Because of the funding and nature of this program, the purchase price will be capped based on costs, and the home will only be made available to a household making less than \$113,000/year.

# **Broadband For All**

# THE WORK CONTINUES

Providing adequate broadband to residents and businesses in our rural areas continues to be one of Story County's highest priorities. In 2021 Story County received a total of \$7.75 million in funding for broadband expansion through lowa's Office of Chief Information Officer (OCIO). This money funded projects in southern and far northern Story County.

But several areas of rural Story County remained unserved or underserved. According to the OCIO, most of our unserved or underserved locations are in north-central Story County (north of Nevada, extending up to County Road E-18) and northwestern Story County.

In an earlier edition of *Our Nevada*, we reported that last spring Story County submitted two applications to the OCIO, with the goal of these areas of the county being designated as Broadband Intervention Zones (BIZ). (The northwestern area application was submitted in conjunction with Boone County and also includes eligible locations in northeastern Boone County.) Both areas were accepted as Broadband Intervention Zones and became eligible to apply for upcoming funding opportunities.

The next funding opportunity, referred to as Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) 8, was open only to providers of broadband service, not to units of local government. We worked with service providers to assess interest and determine how the County can help them move forward in securing funding to increase fast, reliable and affordable broadband in rural Story County. Applications were due by Aug. 25, 2023. ICS Advanced Technologies applied for the northwest Story area and Colo Telephone applied for north-central Story area.

The OCIO recently announced the awards for NOFA 8. The awards are listed on the OCIO website: https://ocio.iowa.gov/empower-rural-iowa-broadband-grant-program-notice-funding-availability-008.

Of 91 applications, only 39 were accepted for funding. The



proposal submitted by (ICS) for BIZ 62 in northwest Story County and eastern Boone County was not selected for funding.

Colo Telephone was awarded \$2.5 million for Broadband Intervention Zone (BIZ) 12 in north central Story County. Because their original request was for \$5.3 million, they needed to scale back their proposed project significantly. However, they will be able to serve many new customers. The above map shows their route and the locations to be served.

According to Shane Bellon, Manager of Colo Telephone, "With the help of this grant, we will be able to empower more rural residents of Nevada and Ames to bridge the digital divide with access to our 100 percent fiber optic, high-speed internet."

Although this round of funding did not do everything we wished, it is certainly progress, and we thank the service providers who submitted proposals as well as staff from Story County, Mid-Iowa Planning Alliance (MIPA) and the Ames Chamber of Commerce who assisted in these applications, and all of the elected officials and local businesses and agencies who wrote letters in support of these applications.

We will continue to work with our service providers to secure additional funding to complete the Story County Broadband picture. We anticipate an announcement soon regarding the application process for the Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) funding that is part of the federal Infrastructure bill.
