WELCOME TO SUMMER

We've transitioned from winter to summer pretty fast over recent weeks, and summer brings with it some wonderful outdoor opportunities, but also some community considerations. We obviously won't list them all, but we'll start a list of things you can do to keep your community safe, beautiful, and enjoyable during the summer months.



Mow correctly! Keep your yard looking tidy by mowing when grass is getting long, and as you mow near the street, be sure you're mowing into the yard and not into the street. Grass clippings in the street (fine is \$300 plus court costs) can be dangerous, especially for bike riders and motorcyclists.



Drive carefully! With kids out of school, you'll definitely see more of them riding bikes, walking around town, and playing outside. This is a time of year to reduce your speed a little bit and pay extra attention.



Be responsible for your pets! We all love our pets and want them to get outdoors for fresh air and exercise. But, be sure when you are taking your pets, especially dogs, outdoors for walks in our community that they are restrained properly and that you have bags to dispose of their waste. Not picking up after them (fine is \$200 plus court costs.) is disrespectful to your community and your neighbors.



Control your noise! Summer brings the best of times to get out in your yard for grill-outs and other gatherings with family and friends, for driving with all the windows down, for shooting fireworks, etc. Be sure that you are cognizant of how your noise level might impact others. When it comes to parties, there is a time at night when the volume of your activities must be reduced; when driving cars and other motorized things, be cautious of the sounds you're making by revving the engine or playing music loud with your windows down; and when shooting fireworks, follow the time allowances set in the City Code.

Do your part to make summer more enjoyable for all!

WHAT TO KNOW



A fireworks show will happen at dusk in Nevada. Fireworks are shot into the air from the west side of SCORE Park. Spectators can view them from the SCORE Park area and at other places in town with a line of sight to the sky above SCORE.

As for those who wish to enjoy fireworks of their own over the holidays, the City of Nevada does allow residents to shoot fireworks during the following dates and times only:

July 1-3: Fireworks can be discharged from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m.

July 4: Fireworks can be discharged from Noon to 11 p.m.

A few more important rules about fireworks, as outlined in the City Code, include:

- You must be 18 or older to discharge a DOT 1.4 class consumer firework without parental supervision.
- Any person discharging fireworks assumes responsibility for their operation and the consequences thereof. Do not discharge them in a reckless manner or manner likely to cause death, injury, fire, or property damage. Do not set off fireworks on a public street.
- Discharge fireworks only on property you own or property where the owner's consent has been given and the owner of the property is present.
- No one can discharge fireworks who is showing visible signs or is determined to be intoxicated or under the influence of a drug or narcotic.



Celebrating 30 years

Cassabaums glad they chose Nevada

Thirty years ago, Steve and Michelle Cassabaum were looking for a place to call “home,” not only for their growing family, but also for the physical therapy business they were starting.

Nevada, Iowa not only fit their vision in terms of the size of community they wanted to be in, but also with what it offered for education and faith. “We wanted our kids to go to a small school, but one big enough for them to have opportunities ... and the St. Patrick’s church community was important to us,” Michelle noted.

Looking back, the couple said they made the right decision

by coming to Nevada. And, not only have the Cassabaums benefited greatly from what Nevada offered to them — the community has benefited greatly from the Cassabaums’ business, 21st Century Rehab, and from the level of involvement the couple has had here. The Cassabaums have been part of many community achievements, such as the new hospital and long-term care facility, SCORE, and the new Nevada Field House.

Serving on the boards of various organizations like the former chamber, the NEDC, the Story Medical Foundation and the Nevada Foundation, the Cassabaums have continuously pushed for Nevada to grow and to have some of the finest

quality-of-life amenities a town this size can offer.

“Nevada is our home, and a community is like your family,” Michelle explained of why they’ve been so involved. “When you love something as we’ve loved Nevada, you want to give back to it.” Steve credits both his parents and Michelle’s parents, business people who were active in their own Iowa communities, for setting a good example of what “giving back” looks like.

Married in 1991, Steve had been working in the St. Louis area after finishing physical therapy school at Washington University. He was an independent contractor for two dental offices, doing specialized therapy for head, neck and jaw pain. Michelle, with a degree in pharmacy, had been working as a pharmacist when the two, who became parents for the first time in 1994, decided to move back to Iowa to be closer to family, and to start 21st Century Rehab.

Wanting to be in business together, Michelle headed back to school, getting another degree, this time in health care administration from Des Moines University. “Then we could be partners, with me on the administrative side and him on the physical therapy side,” Michelle said.

The partnership has worked well. Over the past 30 years, 21st Century Rehab has grown from starting with Steve and two other employees in the basement of the old Story County Hospital building to having a beautiful space in the new Story Medical Center and to operating clinics in 13 other Iowa communities, and employing around 125 employees, 18 of them in Nevada.

Steve smiles thinking back to those early days in the hospital basement with the very low ceilings. “I was used to wearing a button-down shirt and tie in St. Louis. That lasted about three days in Nevada, because it was so hot in that basement,” he said.

He had contracted with Story Medical to provide physical therapy, and as he grew his business into the basement hallways, Story Medical grew — first on the west side of its older building — to accommodate 21st Century’s growing clientele and staff.

In half of its locations in Iowa, 21st Century Rehab still contracts with a local hospital. In the other half, it has stand-alone clinics. Both scenarios work well, thanks to the incred-

ible team they’ve established — a team that includes several business partners and their three daughters.

Emma, who attended Luther and has a master’s from George Washington University, is Director of Patient Experience. “She has taken the responsibility to manage all of the non-licensed support staff off of my plate,” Michelle said.

Elli, who graduated from Iowa State University, is the business Public Relations and Marketing Director.

Kati, a physical therapist like her father with degrees from UNI and Des Moines University’s PT school, is practicing at the Cassabaum’s clinic in Altoona. Steve and Michelle are excited to share that Kati will, in the near future, become a sixth partner in the business.

Steve is still seeing patients a few days a week. He’s been practicing physical therapy for 36 years. “I would like to get to 40,” he remarked. He also spends a lot of time mentoring the younger PTs in the company.

Michelle makes it clear, she and her husband are not ready to retire yet.

The Cassabaums will celebrate their 30th anniversary in business, which started 30 years ago this month to be exact, with a special event for their employees in August. “We may do something to celebrate with the community too,” Michelle said.

When asked about their thoughts on celebrating 30 years, Steve gets emotional and has trouble getting the words out at first. “I think about the great people we’ve helped and served, like Gene Newsome (recently deceased). That’s the most rewarding for me. And then I think about our employees, who

are like family.”

Michelle said she tries to embrace every moment of the journey and celebrate the growth. “I think of exponentially the amount of people we’ve been able to touch by replicating the success we’ve had in Nevada in 13 other communities. That’s very rewarding.”

The two also share insight on why they’ve been able to work this well together. “The biggest thing ... we have complete trust in one another, and that has allowed us to focus on our unique talents that we each bring to the table,” Michelle said. Steve agrees. “The trust is there and we continue to complement each other’s strengths each and every day.”

Protocols for mosquito fogging notifications

Want to know when "Mosquito Fogging/Spraying" will happen? The City offers the following notifications:

- 1) The Alert box on the front of the City website: www.cityofnevadaiaowa.org
- 2) An Alert notice by email/text (sign up on the City website to receive them)
- 3) A post on the City of Nevada, IA Facebook page

City officials monitor a website maintained by the ISU Entomology Department that keeps a count on the mosquito population. The city will spray when the mosquito count indicates the need and weather conditions allow.

Water and wastewater rate update

EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2025

To ensure continued reliable service and address rising operational costs, the City will implement a 3 percent annual increase in water rates, effective for all bills due on or after July 1, 2025. This yearly adjustment helps cover increasing expenses, particularly in chemical supplies, and supports future upgrades to the City's Water Plant.

In addition, the new Wastewater Treatment Facility is anticipated to begin operations in June 2025. With the introduction of a new operations and maintenance (O&M) budget and outstanding debt obligations, revised wastewater rates will be necessary to meet annual financial requirements.

Proposed rate changes will be announced soon. Please stay informed by visiting the City of Nevada website for updates as more information becomes available.

Recycle cell phones to help gorilla habitats

A critical component in smartphones and other devices is a substance called coltan. Eighty percent of the world's supply of coltan is found directly in the center of gorilla habitat in the Congo. Mineral mining for smartphones has fueled bloody conflicts and gorilla habitat loss. The best way you can reduce this impact is recycling old smartphones and limiting unnecessary upgrades to a new device.

Story County Conservation has partnered with the Blank Park Zoo and ECO-CELL to recycle your old smartphones (and iPad, tablets, mp3 players, handheld gaming systems, chargers, and device accessories). ECO-CELL is a nonprofit which reclaims the precious minerals found inside these devices. Recycling these items helps save endangered gorillas by reducing the demand for coltan

while 100 percent of the proceeds from this project go directly toward reforestation in the Congo and care for rescued gorillas.

Poised to Deliver Needed Care

LaVille Thoren, DNP, Joins Story Medical to Provide Mental Health Services Across the Lifespan

With a passion rooted in personal experience and professional dedication, Dr. Kennedy LaVille Thoren, DNP, ARNP, PMHNP-BC, has joined Story Medical Clinic - Nevada to offer comprehensive mental health care to patients across the age spectrum.

Dr. LaVille Thoren, a board-certified Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner, brings a compassionate, evidence-based, and integrative approach to care. She will begin seeing patients on June 30 and her services will be available to children, adolescents, adults, and older adults in the community. Her arrival fills a critical need for accessible, local mental health support.

Firsthand Experience

"Growing up, I witnessed firsthand how hard it can be to access mental health care," Dr. LaVille Thoren says. "That experience drew me into health care, and my work as a nurse only deepened that passion. I worked with many young patients in acute settings who were struggling with mental health. It became clear to me that there was more I could do—so I pursued advanced practice nursing."

Her clinical background is diverse, including work in inpatient psychiatry, emergency rooms, intensive care,

community mental health, and home-based behavioral health. Prior to joining Story Medical, she worked for UnityPoint Health, where she launched pediatric psychiatry services, and Optum, where she led behavioral health integration efforts in primary care settings.

Treating the Whole Person

At Story Medical, Dr. LaVille Thoren provides psychiatric evaluations, medication management, and supportive psychotherapy, as well as referrals for additional therapy, lifestyle interventions, and holistic care. Her goal is to treat the whole person—emotionally, physically, and socially.



"Good mental health care is never just about prescribing medication," she says. "It's about building trust, listening, and working together to find what's best for the patient."

Dr. LaVille Thoren says she was drawn to Story Medical by its patient-centered philosophy and community focus.

"This is a smaller organization where people are invested in doing what's right for patients," she says. "That means I have time to really connect with the people I'm caring for. That time is critical—especially when it comes to mental health care."

The ability to form long-term relationships with patients is what excites her most about joining the outpatient clinic setting.

"When you're helping someone through anxiety, depression, trauma, or a mood disorder, consistency and trust are essential," Dr. LaVille Thoren says. "That's what makes being embedded in a primary care environment so powerful—we're meeting people where they are."

Delivering Care When and Where it is Needed

Access is also a key part of Dr. LaVille Thoren's mission.

"Mental health care should be available to everyone, regardless of where they live," she says.

"Bringing services like this to a rural community like Nevada ensures that people don't have to travel far to get the support they need. That makes a real difference," she adds.

With a commitment to holistic, collaborative care and a heart for the community, Dr. LaVille Thoren's arrival is a significant step forward for local mental health access—and for the individuals and families who will benefit from her expertise.

uniforms, and cheer and football uniforms into hand-crafted keepsake bears. This project also received a Gold rating and qualified for Nationals.

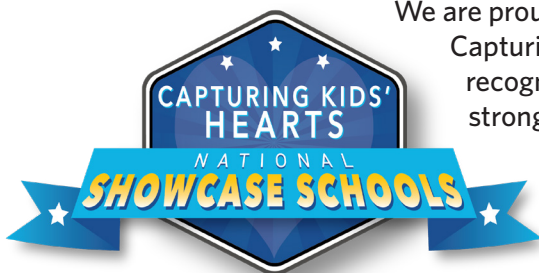

Cub Crew Mentorship builds Readers and Leaders

The second annual "Cub Crew" partnership, which pairs third- and fourth-grade students with kindergarten, first, and second graders, has successfully wrapped up. The purpose of this mentorship was to support younger students by having an older mentor listen to them and practice reading books together. Four days a week, the students met in the mornings and spent 10-15 minutes reading. The program lasted six weeks.

Kedra Hamilton (Instructional Guide), Erin Murphy (School Counselor), and Dee Brown (Paraprofessional) trained and supervised the third- and fourth-grade students. They learned how to actively listen, provide positive feedback, and offer help when a younger student got stuck on a tricky word.

The benefits of this program were both measurable and immeasurable. Younger students developed reading fluency and stamina, while older students took on responsibility, built friendships, and supported their younger buddies. It was heartwarming to watch strong and caring relationships form as kindergarten, first, and second graders grew as readers, and third and fourth graders celebrated their successes right alongside them.
