NEVADA FOUNDATION GRANT CYCLE OPENS

In 2019, the Nevada Foundation was formed as a nonprofit public charity. The Foundation was established to accept gifts for community betterment. To help focus these efforts, a "Seasons of Giving" fund was established to coordinate a continuous cycle of giving.

The first grant cycle for Seasons of Giving is now open (Oct. 1, 2025) and applications are due by 4 p.m. on Nov. 14, 2025. A notification of awards will be announced no later than Dec. 5, 2025. Four (4) \$5,000 grants and one (1) \$10,000 grant are available this grant cycle.

Eligible recipients are as follows (one application per organization):

- Tax exempt, non-profit entities classified by the IRS as 501(c) (3) or a 170 (b) governmental entity based in Nevada, Iowa (or grant funds will serve Nevada residents)
- If not 501(c) (3), NON-PROFIT organization must have a fiscal sponsor who will be legally & financially responsible

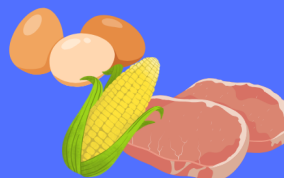
Iowa's GDP

Manufacturing represents 17% of our GDP and exports over \$26 billion worth of goods.



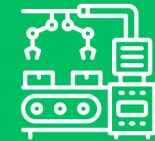
Operations in Iowa

Nevada Students Recognized in National Math Stars Program

In partnership with the Iowa Department of Education, National Math Stars (NMS) is honoring the state of Iowa's most advanced young mathematicians. This year, several students from the Nevada Community School District earned recognition for their excellence.

The National Math Stars program identifies third graders who demonstrate exceptional ability by scoring in the top 2 percent statewide on the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) in mathematics. Out of thousands of students across Iowa, four Nevada third graders stood out for their achievements as shown above: Maddux Adams, Lewie Wakeman, Warren Koster, and Bailey VanderWiel.

Their distinction reflects not only their mathematical talent, but also their commitment to learning and the strong support of their teachers and families. Each of these students demonstrated advanced problem-solving skills, perseverance, and a love of mathematics that set them apart from their peers.

Among these outstanding students, Bailey VanderWiel achieved an even higher honor by being named a National Math Stars Finalist. This recognition places her among the top young mathematicians across the country. From an initial pool of more than 6,000 applicants, Bailey

advanced through the first round of applications and rigorous testing, which narrowed the group to fewer than 400 students. She then completed another challenging exam and interview process to determine the top 100 students nationwide.

Although Bailey did not move forward into that final round, her accomplishment is remarkable. Advancing through multiple levels of competition required both strong mathematical knowledge and the ability to think critically under pressure. Reaching the finalist stage of such a competitive national program is an achievement that few students experience, and the Nevada Community School District is incredibly proud of her success.

The recognition of Maddux, Lewie, Warren, and Bailey highlights the academic strength of Nevada's students and the dedication of its educators. Achievements like these shine a spotlight on the district's commitment to nurturing talent and preparing students to excel not only in mathematics, but in all areas of their education.

The district congratulates these four students and their families for this outstanding honor and looks forward to watching them continue to grow as scholars and leaders in the years ahead.

Outsmart Overuse Injuries This Fall

These Tips Will Help You Remain Ready to Race

Your registration is paid, the mileage chart is on the fridge, and race-day playlists are already in draft mode. Don't let a nagging ache derail months of training. Lindsay Bierbaum, DPT, clinic director at 21st Century Rehab in Nevada, says most late-summer and autumn running injuries start small and are completely preventable with the right prep.

"Shin splints, IT-band pain, and plantar fasciitis rarely show up out of nowhere," Bierbaum says. "If you can catch these early, you'll stay on the road."

Treat Stretching as Mileage, not a Maybe

- Dynamic first, static last. Before a run, use leg swings, walking lunges, and ankle circles to warm up the tissues. Save 30-second calf, quad, and hamstring holds for afterward.
- Total time goal: 10-12 minutes—about two songs—every run.

Shoe Fit > Shoe Brand

- Keep a thumb's width between longest toe and shoe tip.
- Heel counter should be snug with no uphill slip.
- Replace running shoes every six months.

- Get a quick gait check at 21st Century Rehab or a specialty shop to confirm whether you need neutral, stability, or motion-control support.

Know the Red Flags and Be Sure to Act Fast

- Morning-after soreness that's worse than post-run tightness? Cut mileage and add a rest day.
- Pinpoint tenderness along shin or foot arch? Ice, swap a run for cycling, and book a PT screen.
- Outer-knee ache that appears mid-run? Strengthen hip abductors.
- First-step heel pain when you get out of bed? Stretch calves, check shoe life, and daily posture.

"Pain that changes your stride is a sign to get evaluated," Bierbaum says. "A single 30-minute PT visit can help better prepare for your season."

Strength Before Speed

Twice a week, add:

- Sidestepping with a theraband for glutes/hamstrings
- Lunges/squats with correct alignment
- Planks for hip stability
- Aim for 3 sets of 12-15 reps.

"Stronger runners tolerate mileage bumps and speedwork without breaking down," Bierbaum says.

Understanding Wastewater Treatment



01 Community

Wastewater is generated in the community, in residences, businesses and industries.

02 Lift Station

Wastewater/sludge travels through lines to a lift station where the City's former WWTP was located.

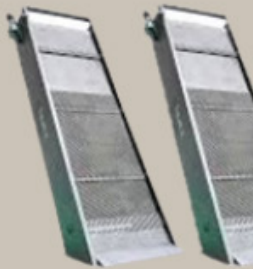


03 To the new WWTP

From the lift station, waste flows through lines to the new WWTP, approximately 3 ½ miles south of Nevada.

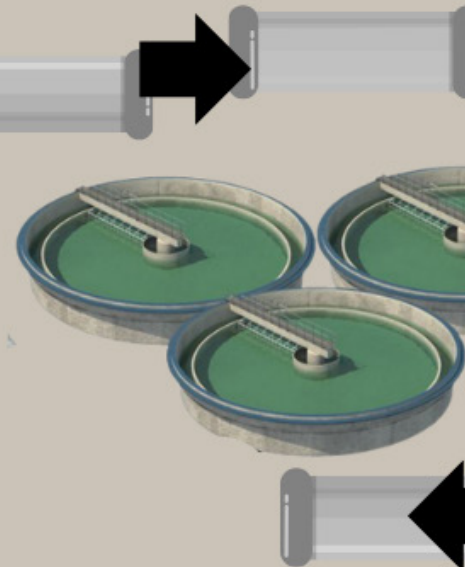
04 Preliminary Treatment

Sewage comes into the plant and goes through a process known as preliminary treatment where solids are removed from the water stream. Wastewater then continues through the treatment plant.



06 Clarifiers

Wastewater floatables, oil, and debris rise to the top and settleables sink to the bottom of the digester, **but** settleable sludge, are either sent back to the digester in treatment OR sent to the sludge line. Wastewater then continues to the next stage.



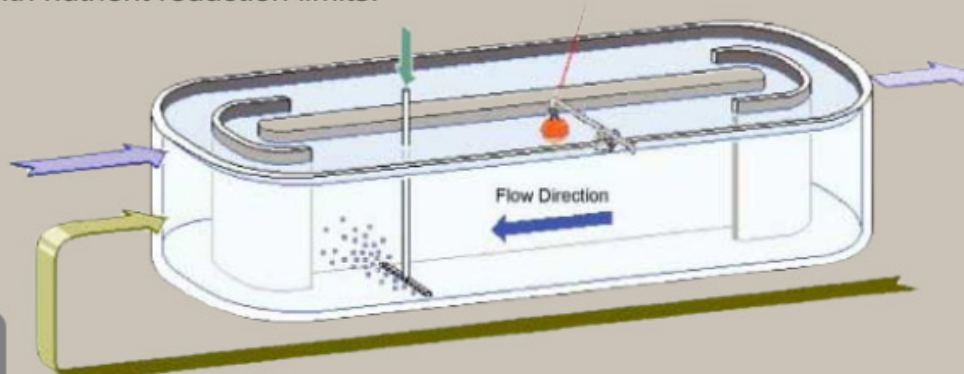

Oxidation Ditch

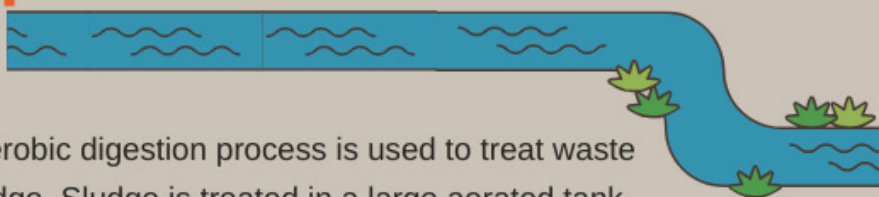
Wastewater next travels into the oxidation ditch, which has three zones: anaerobic, anoxic and aerobic. Each zone creates an environment for certain bacteria to grow and biologically treat the wastewater to comply with nutrient reduction limits.

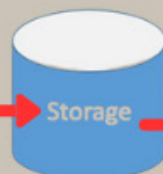
Disinfection

Wastewater travels to the UV Disinfection system where UV light changes the DNA of any pathogens to ensure they cannot reproduce. This makes Nevada, Iowa's effluent cleaner than ever before!



Note: The aerobic digestion process is used to treat waste activated sludge. Sludge is treated in a large aerated tank where micro-organisms break down organic matter. Sludge is thickened before being sent to storage. During optimal times of the year, sludge is taken from storage and used as nutrient rich fertilizer for local croplands.

3 new PARKING ordinances going into effect

HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

1) 69.11 Truck and Boat parking limited

This is probably the biggest change to the parking code, considering it has the potential to affect the entire city. The purpose of this code change is to reduce damage to city streets, allow for ease of parking, and increase visibility on roadways.

First, on reducing the damage to city streets: City streets are designed for commerce, or vehicles traveling on them, and not specifically designed to place heavy objects on them long term. The weight of a vehicle is taken into consideration for parking. This code section covers vehicles that are not allowed to park for anything other than loading and unloading and performing work, but could easily be described as any vehicle requiring the driver to possess a CDL class A or B to operate it.

Second, allowing for ease of parking and reducing damage to city streets: Any unattached trailer cannot be parked on the roadway. Previously, the city had a 48-hour restriction to any motorized vehicle; however, trailers are not defined as a motorized vehicle and therefore would not be restricted. This allowed for trailers, campers, and other non-motorized items to sit for extended periods with the city not being able to affect them. Additionally, the front hitch of these trailers allows for a large amount of weight to be supported in a small area on the roadway. This has historically caused damage to streets and the need for repairs.

Third, increasing visibility: This is accomplished by removing unattached trailers, including campers, from the roadway. The city has implemented a standard for oversized vehicles from

being parked on the roadway for anything other than loading and unloading or performing work. The size is greater than 10 feet wide or 30 feet long.

2) 69.10 All night parking prohibited updates

This lists all the city-owned areas that restrict the ability to park overnight. The addition to this part of the code is to restrict parking in the parking lots of City-owned parks. All parks are listed as no parking from 2-6 a.m. This was meant to ensure that people who desire to use the park have allotted parking spaces, and it also allows Parks and Rec staff to perform maintenance on or around the parking areas.

3) 69.08 No parking zones update

The update to no parking zones is primarily focused on the housing area located south of Nevada High School. In this area, parking is now restricted to one side of the roadway to allow for emergency vehicle access. Also, 14th Street between H Avenue and J Avenue is restricted to one side.

The City and Public Safety Department's goal is to gain compliance by educating the public on what these code updates mean. With this in mind, officers will not initially be issuing parking tickets for violations to these ordinances.

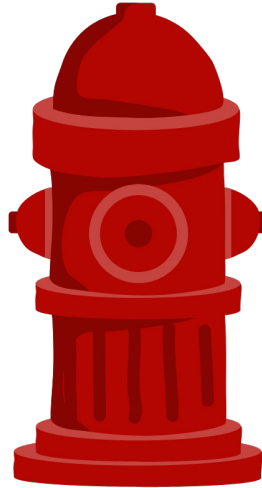
As with any parking restrictions, exceptions to the posted code may be authorized by the Chief of Police

HYDRANT FLUSHING TIME

During the month of October, the City Water Department crew will flush water lines via fire hydrants. Because of line flushing, residents in the immediate vicinity of the work may experience temporary discoloration of their water or lower water pressure. The discoloration consists primarily of harmless silt and air. It does not affect the safety of the water. If you experience discoloration after crews have flushed your neighborhood, clear the pipes in your home by running all faucets with cold water for a few minutes. SPRAYING OF PUBLIC GROUNDS

September and October are the months when Parks and Rec staff spray all park grounds, the cemetery and other public grounds owned by the City. This spraying helps with weed control.

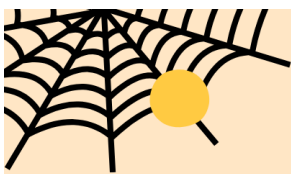

Nevada: A surprising destination for more than just work

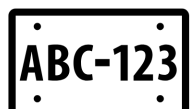
